Maternal side of my family Phillips.

On the paternal side of my mother's parents there are the Phillips who were settlers stock but not 1820.

My Great Grandfather was William Henry Phillips and he came out to South Africa alone in the Weymouth in 1845, landing at Port Elizabeth. Two years later he returned to his home town, Little Cheverell West Lavington, Devizes, Wiltshire, to fethh his wife and family and they settled in Grahamstown district of Albany.

Great Grandmother Phillips was born Jene Ann Boulten baptized at St. Peter's Little Cheverell, March 15th 1814, daughter of James and Sarah of Parva Cheverell, Wilts. Their marriage banns were called at St. Peter's Church on February 7th, February 24th and March 3rd, 1833. At the back of William's decision to emigrate was, as the case with most of the early settlers, dissatisfaction with trade conditions in England. He was a tile maker and carpenter by trade and employed as foreman of a brick and tiles works, owned by the Hicks Beach family. There was some sort of dispute about the patent right for an invention of a machine for cutting drain pipes which he claimed was his.

Conditions generally were bad in the country, not yet recovered from the effects of the Napoleonic Wars, so emigration must have been more of an escape for him than a wrench.

Great great grandfather was William and he was a tenant farmer living in a three storied house in or near Devizes and of which they seemed to have been very fond. He was a local lay preacher of renown and was married three times. Of his sons all except William emigrated either to America or Australia and very little is known about them.

Other families which came out to the Cape in 1820 were closely related to us. I believe there were the Woods, Dells and Ushers (the whisky people). James Ushers was a brother to William's mother and it is possible that because of the relationship he decided to come to this country.

A lay preacher in those days, I understand, he would have been known as a dissenter, which meant that he had broken away from the church, and although it was compulsory for marriage to take place in church this was not the case with baptisims and may account for the fact that I was unable to trace the births of his children. I did, however, eventually trace the birth of William son of William and Mary Bapt. February 3rd 1810 in the church records Westbury.

Interesting too was a record of birth March 29th 1807 of Sarah Napier base born daughter of Mary Usher by Tregonwell Napier.

I feel this Mary may be the same Mary Usher who married Samuel Phillips 15.6.1807, at Westbury, possibly a brother to William and this may account for the breadking away from the church.

Great Great Grandfather William tried his luck at farming in the Trappes Valley Bathurst District, Albany. They hired and ploughed a large tract of ground and at first all seemed to be going fine. The waving wheat was a grand sight but then came the rust and they were ruined.

These were indeed trying times for this family, large and young, and to provide for them he had to turn his hand to any jobs offering. Not much of the boys! lives were used for education, as soon as they could, while still in their early teens, they had to work.

Harry, the eldest, possibly worked on a farm, while James was for a time apprenticed to a draper in Grahamstown.

The Voters Roll for Grahamstown in 1853 gave William Phillips' address as "Dells Row" and from Mr. W. Bain Lanham of Grahamstown in 1964, I received the following information:

(Dells Rowh was the little street at the back of the City Hall which continues accross Hill Street and then becomes "New Street" in Grahamstown. This Knight Street has a row of small houses which was known as "Dells Row" built by a merchant to accommodate his customers from up country on their arrival with their transport wagons.

About 1840 there was a Dell in New Street, a Cooper, but whether the whole length of Knight and New Streets wan then known as New Street, I have not had time to check, but I am pretty certain Knight Street was then still portion or part of New Street and Dell might have occupied one of the houses, or being a Cooper had to do with the Street metal works. The creek below the area is referred to (from memory) as "Bog-a-inn-fin", a swampy marsh at the back of New Street.)

In June 1969 I visisted Knight Street, and found still standing two out of the original six semi-detached cottages once known as Dells Now. The present owners are a Mr. Saunders, aged 80 years, living in the one cottage, and his sister, aged 83 years, occupies the other. Their father was a very well known surgeon in Grahamstown, and their the mother was the daughter of the Duchess of Lindsey. I had a most interesting conversation with Mr. Saunders, who said that the cottages were the married quarters for the British military built in 1812. Apparantly there were stables and close by a bakery, where the Saunders played as children.

When Knight Street was built the first two cottages were demolished and over the years the two cottages at the other end were removed.

At Cory Library, Rhodes University, they have a map of Grahamstown dated 1814. The stables are marked in this area and the names of owners of buildings among them a Captain and other military personnel.

The cottages were crudely built of large stone and must be among the oldest buildings in Grahamstown. Standing inside the one cottage, I tried to imagine what my Great Grandparents the phillips, and their family were like. I belive it was here that the last child, John, was born in 1852.

As already stated earlier Dells were related in some way to the Phillips in fact I found in the archives, Cape Town, the address of Edward Hunt Dell, born Wiltshire England 1981, an 1820 Settler. Furthermore, two sons of his were named John and Samuel, family name of Phillips. A third son was called after his father Edward Hunt Dell who died 25.5.1896, at Grahamstown, leaving letters of administration of his affairs to Henry Richard Mood, possibly another relative of curs.

Yet another interesting fact is the record of birth of William Phillips and Anna Janeborn Boulten's last child John, born March 25th 1852, almost certainly in Grahamstown.

There was a notice in the Grahamstown Journal which read: Found straying on the flat about 2½ miles from Grahamstown to the right of the Bay Road, 11 goats which the owner can obtain from the undersigned by paying all expenses - signed,

Wm. Phillips, Grahamstown March 23rd, 1852.

The family only left Grahamstown for Peddie in 1853/54 and according to a copy of John's Baptismal Certificate from St. Simon and St. Judes Church, Peddie, he was baptised there in 1859. Sc John was obviously born at Dell's Row, Grahamstown or near by.

At this point I shall go back to give an account of the maternal side of my mother's family, namely the Purdons and Cockcrofts, both 1820 Settlers' families.

Maternal side of my family Purdons and Cockerofts both 1820 British Settlers.

The sudden and peaceable invasion of the African shores was part of a general emigration movement in England as a solution to the difficult economical and political problems, which at the time taxed the government.

From 1770 to 1820 a great transformation known as the Industrial Revolution was passing over England. Then the termination of the Napoleonic Wars and the establishment of peace in 1815. In consequence hurdreds of soldiers had to be discharged.

My Great Great Grandfather John Purdon, among them was receiving a pension of 1/10 per day after almost 35 years of service to his King and country.

Notes from 1820 Settlers Museum, Grahamstown:

Interesting to note too that in the year 1867 M. Cockcroft's daughter Hillaria (my grandmother) married Arthur Phillips at Shrewsberry Peddie.

Great Aunt Emily Phillips married Charles McCallaghan about 1854/55. I could not find records of this marriage, but their first child was born in the district of Albany 1855. The only record of this couple at Peddie was given at the owners of the farm Tharfield for the years 1865 to 1868 when the ownership was given as John Weakly. From what I can gather Charles McCallaghan spent most of his early life transport riding as seen from the records of his children's births.

Charles had married Emily Phillips eldest child of William Henry Phillips and Ann Jane (born Boulter) about 1854/55.

Charles son of John and Sarah born McGuines, was born in 1834 on Kaalhoek farm, Winterbery div. of Fort Beaufort of C.Colony situated in the upper Stormberg spruit extent 1616 morgen.

April 22nd 1859. The baptism of John the last child born to Great grandparents William & Ann Jane Phillips took place at the Anglican church St. Simons and St. Judes, Peddie.

Sept. 22nd 1864. The marriage between Henry William eldest son of William and Ann Jane Phillips and Mary Ann Randall at St. Simons & St. Judes Church, Peddie. Their first two children born at Peddie were (1) William Henry B. Longridge Farm Peddie 22/8/1865.

(2) James Rupert B. Thornhill Farm Peddie 3/9/1867.

June 23rd 1867. The marriage between Arthur 4th son of William Henry and Anne Jane Phillips and Hillaria Cockcroft (my grandparents).

They were married in a dear little methodist church, Shrewsbury Chapel, Peddie District.

The Chapel was erected in 1861 and had past its centenary when we visited there in 1964. We were lucky to be able to attend, as the services with communion following, only take place once amonth in these remote places. It is a lovely little church unchanged in all those years except that the pulpit then attached to the wall now stands on the ground. Hanging from the ceiling are two lovely brass and glass lamps, and there is a small old fashioned organ (the original).

I was filled with deep emotion during the service imagining my grandparents. Grandmother tall and stately always with very good taste
in clothes, and grandfather Arthur who was very good looking and always beautifully groomed. It was said of him that he was a sound
and interesting man above average in intellect. It would have been
interesting to know who attended the wedding that day, and I wondered
too how many other encestors had graced this little sanctuary all
those years ago.

I enjoyed meeting Rev. Walker of the methodist church with whom I had corresponded several times and from whom I had received so much information.

We visited St. Simon & St. Judes church in Peddie, older I should think and more ornate than Shrewsbury, also attended by ancestors in the past.

My Grandparents first three children were born in the District of Peddie.

Aunt Mary at Thornhill Farm June 3rd 1868.

Aunt Emily " Bishopston " Dec. 9th 1869.

Uncle Clement at Benton " Sept. 13th 1872.

There were several children born at Peddie namely Phillips, Cockcrofts, McCallaghans, Purdons, Ushers, etc. too numerous to mention here but, I will place the ones most closely related to our family in a family tree.

I don't think that the settlers were very happy at Peddie. Again their attemps at farming on their farms Wanstead and Dunstan Peddie Dist. given to them by the Government in 1853 could not have been a success.

The Standard Bank lent them £200 to buy wagons and oxen, with no security. So they were set up as transport riders, and worked between Port Elizabeth and Kimberley crossing the Orange River at Aliwal, and in the later years travelling as far as the Transvadl.

In the course of all this leisurely travelling back and forth, the Phillips brothers and Charles McCallaghan came to know different parts of the country pretty well especially in the Cape Colony and realised that there was a better future further north.

1869/70. From about this date it is interesting to note from records of births, marriages and deaths etc. that all our Phillips ancestors and most of Mark Cockcrofts descendants eventually came to settle in the Wodehouse District in the Eastern Province.

The Phillips first settled at Sterkspruit then Bushmanshoek and finally Sterksprum Flaggwkraal and Birds River.

I visited all these places during my search in 1962-67.

At Sterkstroom and Molteno there are descendants of Great Uncle Henry William Phillips (Mother's Uncle) and 3rd cousins to me. We were warmly accepted in their homes and taken over Gretna Farms at Sterkstroom, which are still owned by the Phillips family and are most prosperous. However, before the families settled down there, there was the Barkley venture which was yet another lost chance in the light of today.

1869/70. About this date the entire Phillips families their parents William and Ann Jane together with their children and Charles McCallaghan and his family formed a party and took grants of 2000 morgen more or less each, somewhere along the upper reaches of Sterkspruit.

Passing of Mr. Arthur Phillips

Irreparable Loss To Community

Mr Arthur Walter Phillips on his farm Flaauwkraal, in the Aliwal North district, at the age of 58 years. This came as a great shock to all who knew him and his passing is a grievous loss not only to his family and friends, but also to the whole farming community.

Flaauwkraal has been the home of the Phillips family since 1879, when Mr Phillips' father, the late Mr James Phillips, who came from Devizes, Wiltshire, England, as a boy in 1845, settled there.

Mr Arthur Phillips attended the Aliwal North High School during the time Mr Carson was Principal there. After service overseas in the army during the first World War, he spent some years in the wool trade in East London and up-country, and then settled at Flaauwkraal.

The death occurred early on the Executive of the North Thursday, September 17, of Eastern Agricultural Union, and as a member of the Soil Conservation Committee of the South African Agricultural Union. He was also chairman of the Soil Conservation Action Committee for the North Eastern Cape, and at the time of his death was making final arrangements for a conference of Soil Conservation District Committees which was to be held in Aliwal North on September 23.

He also served on the Jamestown Farmers' Assistance Board and did very valuable work there.

As Justice of the Peace for his ward Mr Phillips served his area well and faithfully, and also did much for the Native and Coloured people.

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OBITUARY.

MR. J. W. PHILLIPS

The death took place at his home in Aliwal North on Tuesday, September 10, of Mr. James William Phillips at the age of 61 years

Mr. Willie Phillips, as he was widely known locally, originally lived at Flaauwkraal in the Aliwal district, where he ran a very extensive business as store-keeper and grain and wool merchant.

In the disastrous period following the first great war, which permanently crippled such a large proportion of the farming community, Mr. Phillips shared the fate of many other prominent business men. Notwithstanding adversity and the fact that he had a young family to provide for, he still had the spirit and made the time to identify himself with public work generally exactly as he had done before.

At Flaauwkraal he left practical evidence of long and faithful service to a remote community. The local Co-operative Cheese Factory. the Primary School premises built by the Administration, the large community Church Hall, the introduction of the preseent transport, telephone and postal services, the organization of farmers in the neighbourhood into a central Far mers' Association are among the institutions for which he must be given the main, and in some cases the sole credit. In addition he played the leading role in securing the extension of the railway from

In particular Mr. Phillips was interested in educational matters and, with his intimate knowledge of all classes and sections in the surrounding areas, he was an institution by himself in the services he so gladly rendered to so many of the less privileged. At the time of his death he was an active and prominent member of the Town Council, the School Board (of which he had been a member for thirty years), the Divisional Council, the High School Committee and the Demobilisation Committee.

Besides these he was a Reen and staunch churchman, serving for many years as steward to the local Methodist congregation.

In political life he was a driving force behind the United Party in the whole constituency, and as Party Chairman for Aliwal North threw himself into organization with his customary vigour and thoroughness.

Educated at Rockeliff (Albany) and at S.A.C.'s he was an enthusiastic sportsman with a special devotion to cricket and school athletics, and his infectious enthusiasm for all forces of wholesome recreàtion made him a prime favourite among people of all ages.

Mentally of studious disposition Mr. Phillips was an uncommonly well-read man and it is to this, even more than to his generous sincerity, that he owed the position he held in public life as an exceptional authority on subjects he had studied.

He leaves a widow and two sons, Messrs. James and Maxwell Phillips, both of whom served throughout the war, and three daughters, Mrs. Dudley Dickin, Queenstown, Mrs. Bobbie Orsmond, Marquard, and Miss Joan Phillips, who is a nurse at Frere Hospital, East London.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. J. C. Slatter, assisted by Dr. E. L. J. Venter, Minister of the Reformed Church and for very many years an associate and close personal friend of Mr. Phillips'. Both paid tribute to a life richly and fully lived, in language simple, dignified and in keeping with the intellectual and moral stature of a man whom Aliwal could not afford to lose.
