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These deed transcription abstracts are arranged generally in chronological order of the deed, and include the volume number, page number, Deed number; followed by the Description including Grantor, Grantee, Date Recorded, Relatives named in the "Lives of," witnesses, Property townland name, rent, and then comments by Adrian Cardell. Each entry also includes the FHL Film number.

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- How to Find the Deeds and the Estate Papers for County Wexford Ireland in the Family History Library (FHL) Catalog (also known as the familysearch catalog)
- A few Bolton deeds not included in Appendix A by Adrian Cardell
- Excerpts from the will of Edward Bolton in 1812 (he died in 1813 at the age of 40) where he states that Ballyduff LOWER was given to him by his late father, Richard Bolton of Ballyduff. He was a brother to one generation

Richard Bolton. They were sons of Richard Bolton who made his will 7 May 1791.

- Griffiths Valuation listings for Ballyduff (1848-1864), A copy of the
  Griffiths Valuation and a transcribed copy with explanation, of these forms
  and the two cousins named Richard Bolton who occupied the two areas
  which were then known as Bally UPPER –the main homestead; and
  Ballyduff LOWER (Primrose Cottage). (See "Focus on the "original"
  Richard Bolton" in this document for the identity of these two cousins).
- Documents on the sale of Ballyduff, in County Wexford, by Richard Bolton, in 1860 (from the Landed Estate Papers); showing that the sale papers stated that the land was first purchased by Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick in 1705.

This shows the pedigree links for ancestors of Elizabeth Nichols –beginning with the Richard Bolton who sold Ballyduff in 1860; who is also the emigrant Richard Bolton, born/baptized in St Iberius parish, County Wexford, Ireland on 20 Oct 1796; married there on 19April 1826 to Frances White; migrated with his family to Adelaide, Ontario, Canada in 1840, where he died in 1876; taking each generation **back** to the "original" Richard Bolton of County Wexford, Ireland – the sale document of Ballyduff identified the purchaser of Ballyduff in 1705 as Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick; with sources for each generation.


COMMENT: Since the first part of the document by Adrian Cardell is on the descendants of the "original" William Bolton, there seemed a need to also discuss the "original" Richard Bolton line- which is the ancestry of Elizabeth Nichols. (Little is known about descendants of the "original" Henry Bolton.)

This section also includes a copy of a deed from County Wexford, taken from microfilm, since deeds are a focus of this entire publication. This sample deed is of 1731 showing the relationship between Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick and Grace his wife and Richard Bolton Jr. The property is Ballyduff.

Richard Bolton Sr identified four sons in four deeds: Edward his eldest (who was age 19 in Feb 1714/15 per his university admission –making him born about 1696), Richard Jr, William, and Henry Bolton. Elizabeth Nichols' line comes from Richard Bolton Sr, through Richard Bolton Jr, who inherited Ballyduff.

Appendix A is the heart of Mr. Cardell's document and consists of most of the BOLTON entries extracted / abstracted from the microfilm of the original deeds of County Wexford, Ireland with his comments, using his legal background to explain the meaning of the deed and its stated and implied relationships.

Mr. Cardell's interest in the Bolton family of County Wexford, Ireland comes from the fact that his wife Jennifer's ancestry is of this Bolton line, having moved to Australia in 1876.

This brief Background/ introduction, plus the Supplement to Appendix A and Focus on the "original" Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and Ballyduff in County Wexford, Ireland are compiled by Elizabeth L. Nichols of Salt Lake City, Utah, USA. The Supplement includes how to find the deeds and estate papers in the Family History Library Catalog (familysearch catalog); and a few additional land records relating to the "original" Richard Bolton who was purchasing land in County Wexford, Ireland by 1702 and gives the pedigree information from the 1840 immigrant Richard Bolton (1796-1896) back to the "original" Richard Bolton, with sources.

BACKGROUND of BOLTON in County Wexford Ireland:

There were three BOLTON men who came into County Wexford, Ireland about the same time – in the late 1600s or very early 1700s. The Registry of

Deeds for County Wexford, Ireland does not begin until 1708. However, deeds created after that date often refer to earlier land transactions. The three men, William BOLTON, Richard BOLTON, and Henry BOLTON, are obviously related. However, the relationship is never stated. They appear to be about the same generation and TO ME they appear to be brothers. For the purposes of this publication, the editors have chosen to identify this generation as the "original" generation -- the "original" William Bolton, or the "original" Richard Bolton or the "original" Henry Bolton.

It is noted that in a 1670 land ownership survey, there were no BOLTON men living in County Wexford who owned land at that date.

The document by Adrian Cardell in Appendix A and the other appendices focuses on the Bolton family in County Wexford; the other parts of his document focus on his line of descent which is from the "original" William Bolton.

The "Supplement to Appendix A" by Elizabeth L. Nichols tells how to find the deeds of County Wexford, Ireland in the Family History Library Catalog (which is the source of the deeds used by Adrian Cardell); and the Landed Estate Papers of County Wexford which include the Sale documents of Ballyduff.

"Focus on the "original" Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and Ballyduff" by Elizabeth L. Nichols follows her ancestry backward from the seller of Ballyduff in 1860 to the "original" Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick who purchased Ballyduff in 1705.

In 2014, which was a couple of years after Elizabeth Nichols began her research into this Bolton family, the wonderful work done by Adrian Cardell came to her attention. Contact was made with Mr. Cardell, who kindly sent Elizabeth Nichols in automated form a copy of his 2000 edition of this manuscript, with permission to use any part of it, as long as credit was given and his copyright honored.

In 2015, Elizabeth Nichols asked permission from Adrian Cardell to make printed copies of his document and bind them with the additions referenced, and give copies to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah and its network of family history centers and to the National Library of Ireland. Mr. Cardell was familiar with the Family History Library and its parent organization, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon), as he had expressed his "debt of gratitude" to them in his document. He used their Family History Center in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia to access the microfilm copies of the deeds during his 15 years of so of research on

the project. Permission was granted.

Following is his response. He also signed the needed agreement to digitalize his document.

## The Background to the Research

Henry Nixon Bolton emigrated to Australia in 1876 with his wife and children. At first, he worked as a clerk in the public service in Brisbane, Queensland, later becoming the Station Master at Warra, a small country town about 150 miles inland from Brisbane. The history of the Bolton family in Queensland is being compiled by a number of descendants.

Henry Nixon Bolton had married Maria Zoe Manchin in 1870 in Dublin. She was described, on their Marriage Certificate, as the daughter of Emmanuel Manchin, wine merchant. Her Death Certificate, while stating that her father's name was John Manchin, stated that her place of birth was Langres, France. A search of French civil records substantiates the fact of her birth in Langres on the 15th May 1840. Her father's name, from the birth register, was Emmanuel Marie Manchin, described as a tailor, and her mother's maiden name was Rose Humblot.

How Maria Zoe Manchin came to be in Dublin is not known. One family legend is that she was a French governess to the Bolton family. Another is that she was a Catholic Novice who ran away with Henry Nixon Bolton.

As to the first legend, I have established that, by 1851, Fossey Bolton, the father of Henry Nixon Bolton was living at Douglas on the Isle of Man and, on his daughter Margaret's wedding certificate, was described as an Accountant. He, and his wife, Mary, (who gave her forenames as "Mary Nixon"), were alive at the 1861 Census on the Isle of Man, and gave their place of birth as Monamolin Ireland. A daughter, Susan, residing with them gave her birthplace as Ballylusk Ireland. Henry Nixon Bolton was not on the Isle of Man on Census night 1861. There were no infant children in the Fossey Bolton Isle of Man family, either in the 1851 or the 1861 Census, and, unless Maria Zoe Manchin was a French governess to a family in Dublin, I cannot see any prospect of that legend having a basis of fact.

As to the second legend, certainly Maria Zoe Manchin was a Roman Catholic. However, to describe a 30 year old woman as a "novice", seems to stretch the imagination. A Bolton family in Adelaide, Australia, descended from Henry Nixon Bolton, in correspondence with Erol Bolton, my late father in law's first cousin, mention a letter they have in their possession, written to Albert Bolton, brother of Henry Fossey Bolton, in 1910, by Maria Zoe Bolton's sister. The letter was from Madrid, Spain, and the author was a Catholic Nun. Perhaps it was this sister's occupation that gave rise to the family legend about Maria Zoe Manchin, herself? I have yet to make contact with the Adelaide family.

There is little in the facts that I have gathered in relation to the ancestors of Maria Zoe Manchin that would explain her marriage certificate claim that her father was a wine merchant. I have no evidence, however, that might call her statement into question.

Her father's paternal grandfather, Edme Manchin, was a "fabriquant", that is, either a worker in, or the proprietor of, a pre industrial revolution "factory".

His father, Gabriel Manchin, was a French professional soldier who had first answered the desperate call of August 1793 to defend the young Republic against the invasion of the Allies. He subsequently served at Toulon, and in Napoleon's Army of Italy, and then in the campaigns against Prussia, Holland, and Austria in Poland, which had begun with the stunning victory of Austerlitz in 1805. Later, in 1808, he served in Spain. He remained in the Army after 1815, serving as a quartermaster sergeant until he was pensioned off in 1829. At his death in Paris, in 1832, he was described as a Porter. Rosalie Bonnemain, the mother of Emmanuel Marie Manchin, the wife of Gabriel Manchin, was described, at her death in Paris in 1836, as a washerwoman.

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Rose Humblot, the mother of Maria Zoe Manchin, was the daughter of Nicholas Bernard Humblot, a carter, and Reine Veronique Carteret, a second hand clothes dealer.

Perhaps a clue to the statement that Emmanuel Marie Manchin was a wine merchant is to be found in the occupation of Claude Carteret, the father of Reine Veronique Carteret. He was described as a "cultivateur" in a marriage document. Certainly the wine industry was well represented around Langres, and it is possible that Emmanuel Marie Manchin found his way into the industry through his wife's family, and went away to sell the product, or even to establish a business in Ireland. It is of interest to note that the 1910 letter from Maria Zoe Bolton's sister is in English, perhaps indicating that the Emmanuel Marie Manchin and his **children** had settled in Ireland.

Further research may uncover Emmanuel Marie Manchin in Ireland, in which case it is more than likely that the explanation for the presence of his 30 year old daughter is simply that she was keeping house for him.

I am in the process of assembling my research into the ancestors of Maria Zoe Manchin, having traced her family roots, in France, back to the 16th Century. I shall distribute the research notes to interested descendants of Henry Nixon Bolton in due course.

Legends aside, the Bolton family in Queensland has clung to the

idea that the Irish ancestors of Henry Nixon Bolton had been drawn from the ranks of the anglo-irish ascendancy.

It is not the purpose of this research tool to recount the history of the Bolton family in Wexford. That can be done once all available evidence has been collected.

For various reasons, few of the primary record sources for genealogical research have survived for Ireland. Census returns for early periods exist only in fragmentary form. The Probate records have been destroyed, as have many Parish Registers.

What secondary source material remains is often, at the best, confusing, and, at the worse, misleading or incorrect. I have consulted many of the secondary sources, such as Marriage Licence Indexes, the International Genealogical Index, Tithes Records, Indexes to Wills, Militia Lists, various publications containing extracts from Wills and Deeds, and The Valuation of Ireland, (1852), compiled by Griffith. Facts gleaned from records such as these have enabled an imperfect picture to be built up.

For example, Fossey Bolton, whom I had at first assumed was Fossey Bolton, the father of Henry Nixon Bolton, is mentioned in The Valuation of Ireland as holding, in 1852, the townland of Ballylusk from William Bolton. As that Fossey Bolton was of the Isle of Man in 1851, it now seems likely that William Bolton's tenant was Fossey Bolton's eldest son, Fossey Bolton. Wexford records confirm that Ballylusk descended from Fossey Bolton of Ballylusk and Isle of Man to his son and then to his grandson, each of whom was named "Fossey".

Given that other secondary research sources show that there were many William Bolton name bearers in County Wexford at that time, the task of establishing who was William Bolton, the landlord of Fossey Bolton of Ballylusk at the Griffith Valuations in 1852, is difficult, as is attempting to assign different William Bolton name bearers to different land holdings, both in the nineteenth century and in the previous one.

In my endeavours to trace the family records, I have been fortunate enough to have had the support of many correspondents.

The late Mrs Frances Dean of California, the late Mrs Elizabeth Bolton-Lee-Flood of Clasheen, Wexford, Mary and Laurence Bolton-Lee of Monamolin, Wexford, and Byron Edwards of Orange County California, were all able to throw light on the Bolton family of Clasheen.

Dr David Greathead of Reading, England, a recent correspondent,

gave me some important leads which have enabled me to identify the lines of descent of many Wexford Bolton families from William Bolton of Ballinvalley, (mentioned in 1710), who was himself probably the son of Henry Bolton of Wells, Finshogue, Ballinvalley, Coldharbour and other Townlands.

Another recent correspondent, Mr Tony Valentine, has sent me details of many descendants of Elizabeth Earl and John Bolton of Wexford, (married by licence in 1818), and, while I have as yet been unable to identify the relationship of the Valentine family to those being researched by me, I consider that a family link will ultimately be revealed.

Norma Stilwell, of Chicago, provided me with the benefit of her research and theories in relation to the derivation of the name "Fossey", from Daniel Fossey, a Soldier in Cromwell's Army, whose descendant, Hester Fossey, it is postulated, brought the family name into the Tackaberry family. I have suggested, based on her research, that Mary Tackaberry, the daughter of Fossey Tackaberry of Tomagaddy, married Henry Bolton of Cullentra, (Wexford marriage licence 1793), and that her family name, "Fossey", was given to their son, Fossey Bolton, of Ballylusk.

Frederick Noel Bolton Newman of Geelong, Australia, a son of Fossey Newman, the grandson of the first Fossey Bolton of Ballylusk, has given me information as to the emigration of Fossey Bolton from Wexford to the Isle of Man. Mr Newman's grandmother, Margaret Bolton, described in a newspaper announcement of her wedding as the fifth daughter of Fossey Bolton, was married on the Isle of Man. She was the sister of Henry Nixon Bolton.

Most fortunate of all has been my years of correspondence with Ned Whelan, the great great grandson of Fossey Bolton, of Ballylusk and the Isle of Man. Ned provided me with a copy of the map of the townland of Ballylusk, prepared for Fossey Bolton in 1840, and also was able to identify the date of construction of "Ballylusk House" from the inscription, "F.B. 1828" on the House which is, now, unfortunately, empty and in disrepair. In addition Ned spent many hours in transcribing, and arranging to have transcribed by local Church of Ireland Priests, many unpublished 19th century records of the Church of Ireland.

As I understand it from Ned, quite a few brace of Pheasant were sacrificed in the cause of Bolton family history research!! His valuable research has enabled me to "backtrack" much of the other evidence that I had reviewed, in particular, the entries in Griffith's Valuation of Ireland, and the 1832 Tithes records.

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Any summary of those to whom I am indebted would not be complete without the acknowledgment of my debt to the Church of Christ of Latter Day Saints, whose vast collection of microfilm records has made my research - so far away from Ireland - and thus this project, at all possible. In particular, I am grateful to their Family History Library at Kangaroo Point, Brisbane, and for the unflagging enthusiasm of their librarian, Mrs Haines, who has encouraged me in this research for almost twelve years.

The usual way to undertake Family History research is to proceed from the last known individual and to work backwards until the most distant ancestor has been found. However, after reviewing all the 19th century material, it became apparent to me that the family had grown to such an extent, and had scattered so far, that the prospect of identifying late 19th century families, by reference to incomplete Church and Public Records, was impossible.

A further problem was that the typical naming practice of the period had been followed, where the pool of ancestors and brothers of ancestors was carried forward, inexorably, to each succeeding generation. The names "Richard", "Henry", and "William", and often "John" and "Edward", occur down the generations.

I decided, therefore, that an investigation into the Irish Deed Register, which commenced in 1708, might provide a means of constructing the family tree **from** the earliest known name bearers to, or at least towards, the modern families. I reasoned that, if one could establish which farm was held in the 19th century, (and in the case of Bolton (Whelan) of Ballylusk, and Bolton-Lee of Clasheen in the 20th Century), it would be possible to start at 1708, the year of commencement of the Deeds Register, and trace the ownership or occupation of individual farms and their conveyance from father to son down the generations.

The task of researching the Irish Deed Register is difficult. The entries in the Indexes are cryptic, and often misleading. The Deeds themselves are represented in epitome form in the Register. In many cases research is frustrated because the clerk who made the epitome omitted what we would consider vital information of genealogical significance, but to him had no legal significance, and, therefore, was not recorded.

Over a number of years I have built up a portfolio of extracts from those Deeds which I consider represent core Bolton family land holdings. I have attempted to find all early 18th Century dealings for Cullentra, Curratubbin, Ballyrea, Ballyduff, Ballinvalley, Ballynestra, and other townlands, such as the

elusive, and as it now seems, non existent, "Cold Harbour", in the hope that patterns of descent might be evident. The extracts that I have, to this date, collected from the Irish Deed Register form Appendix A.

One of the most difficult tasks in researching the Deeds is to identify townlands, given that many of them have several aliases. Fortunately I have found a Deed which is in the nature of a Rosetta Stone, giving as it does up to three aliases for particular townlands, one of which was the elusive Clasheen. Now that we know that Clasheen was also known as Lassinglassin, it can be identified, and its family members assigned on the basis of the handing down of the land from each generation to its succeeding one.

As more and more information emerged from the Register of Deeds. I found that previous authorities, Burke, in <u>Landed Gentry of Ireland</u>, (all editions) and Charles Knowles Bolton, in <u>Bolton Families in Ireland</u>, had not only cannibalised several families, but had also ignored the existence of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, a key ancestor of the Island family traced in Burke, and had, as I suggest in the Comments to Appendix A, wrongly attributed family members to particular stems.

The errors in Landed Gentry of Ireland and Bolton Families in Ireland are of such an extreme order that I would consider them unreliable. Until the contrary is proved, I would regard any 16th or 17th century references in those authorities as entirely fanciful, while eighteenth century entries are seriously flawed. Perhaps Burke and C. K. Bolton, can, in relation to the senior Bolton of the Island line, be relied on after, say, 1800. So far as cadet lines are concerned, those that rely on nineteen century records may probably be trusted, while eighteenth century records are, in many cases, as I demonstrate, seriously flawed. I would recommend, however, that any researcher verify claimed "facts" for all families in those reference works, at the very least for the period before 1800.

In <u>Appendix B</u> I have set out part of C. K. Bolton's claimed chain of descent, which in many respects mirrors the line of descent in Burke, with my comments, based on my research, principally, into the Irish Deed Register.

In Appendix C I have constructed "Title Deeds", to show the dealings, with each important individual townland, in chronological order. It will be noted that the "Title Deeds" have been prepared on the basis that my assumptions, in identifying townlands, are correct. The basis of my belief, in each case, is set out in my comments to the Deeds in Appendix A.

Finally, in <u>Appendix D</u> I have set out the various dealings, from 1702 to 1819, in chronological order.

I have resisted the temptation to prepare a Family Tree, commencing from the earliest "suspected" ancestors of the various Bolton families that I have reviewed, and have preferred to speculate, in Appendix A, wherever relevant, as to possible family relationships. I am acutely conscious of the fact that, in my various summaries of suspected family relationships, I have, for the most part, posed questions rather than provided answers. I am concerned, too , that certain of the conclusions that I am inevitably drawn to, seem, in some cases, to defy, or, at the lease, challenge, logic.

For example, how does one resolve the relationship between Henry Bolton of Wells Finshoge part of Ballinvalley and Coldharbour, William Bolton of Ballinvalley and Curratubbin, and Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. Inheritance of property by Henry Bolton of Ballyrea from Henry Bolton of Wells would, ordinarily indicate a descent from father to son. On the one hand, however, there is ample evidence in other Deeds that William Bolton of Ballinvalley is the father of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, though, on the other hand, I have no evidence of land passing from William Bolton of Ballinvalley to Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. There is, of course, much evidence of land owned by William Bolton of Ballinvalley being transferred by descent to persons other than Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, not only in the male line but, in the case, at the least, of the Rowsom family, in the female line.

I have speculated on the close family relationship that must have existed between Henry Bolton of Wells and Richard Bolton senior of Kilpatrick Crane and Ballinvalley, based on their ownership of contiguous lands. I have, nevertheless, not been able to find a Deed in which any relationship, let alone a close relationship, is referred to. At least, in the case of William Bolton of Ballinvalley and Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, a close relationship can be demonstrated by both of them being named lives in a Deed dealing with a key Bolton property.

The size of the land holding of Henry Bolton of Wells, William Bolton of Ballinvalley, and Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick around 1710 indicates that they were, if they were a family, (as I suggest), comparatively large land holders. In his book, Byron Edwards recounts a Clasheen family legend that three brothers came to Ireland with Cromwell and received large land grants. It would be tempting to assume that Henry Bolton of Wells, Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, and William Bolton of Ballinvalley, were those persons, or, perhaps, their descendants. I have, however, been unable to find a reference to this family in the lists of soldiers who received land grants from Cromwell. Furthermore, all the evidence I have accumulated shows that the Bolton family

under review were, in the main, under tenants around 1710, only one of whom, Richard Bolton, had recently acquired the equivalent of freehold from his former landlords.

If one accepts that Henry Bolton of Wells is, indeed, the father of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, that William Bolton later of Dublin and the Island, the son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, was born around 1710, and that Edward Bolton of Kilpatrick, eldest son of Richard Bolton Senior of Kilpatrick came of age in the 1720's, one is driven to the conclusion that Henry Bolton of Wells is the eldest, William Bolton of Ballinvalley is next, and Richard Bolton senior of Kilpatrick is the youngest. Yet, Richard Bolton alone is "freeholding" land. The others continue, for the most part, for many decades, as tenants.

As well as holding leasehold property, Richard Bolton senior, of Kilpatrick, held the equivalent of the freehold of Crane Kilpatrick and Ballinvalley, and of Ballyduff. Henry Bolton of Wells held the lease of Wells, Finshogue, part of Ballinvalley, (that is, part of the Ballinvalley, the freehold of which had been purchased by Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, it seems), and Coldharbour. He also seems to have had an interest in Court or Courtballyedmond and another Ballyduff. William Bolton of a Ballinvalley different held the leasehold of "Ballinvalley", and Curratubbin, while his son Henry Bolton of Ballyrea held the leasehold of Ballyrea.

Contrary to the evidence of relative ages discussed above, one would assume, from this information, that, if Richard Bolton senior of Kilpatrick and William Bolton of Ballinvalley were brothers, then Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick would have been the older brother.

One solution to this question might be that Henry Bolton of Wells and the **father** of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick were brothers, and that the central family land holding around "Coldharbour" was inherited from **their** father.

There are, of course many other possible explanations. They might have been related from a generation further back. Richard Bolton, although a younger son, may have married particularly well, and his wife may have brought capital into the marriage. Note in that context that she is made party to a Deed in 1729, when Upper and Lower Kilmihill are mortgaged. See Appendix A Volume 60 Page 405 Number 41663.

They might, although it is extremely unlikely, have been strangers!!

There are further Deeds which, based on what has already been uncovered, must exist, and which are yet to be traced. From

them, I am confident that further clues will emerge which may enable us to resolve, at least in part, the questions I have posed and, more hopefully, may enable us to prepare an accurate line of descent.

In publishing the research accumulated to this date, as I have said elsewhere, it must be appreciated that the research remains unconcluded and inconclusive. However, as there are many people working on Bolton family research at the moment, none of whom, to my knowledge is working in this area, the circulation of my research may trigger further research, or help make some connections for them.

I would welcome comment, criticisms, and suggestions from the reader.

Biographical Information (by a cousin, Byron Edwards):

Adrian Cardell, a retired judge living in Australia, conducted extensive research on the Bolton Family of County Wexford. His wife was a Bolton descendant. He published this material in 1998. Notes on the *Genealogy of the Bolton Family of Ballylusk Wexford*. Vital Records and property data are scarce in Ireland. Much of the original material from various Churches, Counties and Irish Courts was gather together in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century and stored in a repository in Dublin. Grievously it was destroyed during the fighting after World War I between England and the Irish who fought for an independent country. These times are known by the Irish as the "Troubles." The Irish eventually prevailed and the Republic of Ireland was formed. Unfortunately the Vital and Land Records that did survive are principally various Indices and Summary Indexes.

Cardell used the available land record deeds to attempt to put together his "genealogy." With some ambiguity and uncertainly he succeeds in putting together a clear picture of the various family members including our Boltons who are placed in Clasheen as early as 1710.

- (a) This dealing has been reconstructed from the information contained in the recitals to the dealing in Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020
- (b) A Doyne Deed that mentions Richard Bolton as a tenant describes his holding as being Kilpatrick, Crane and part of Ballinvalley. See Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825. The same Deed refers to Henry Bolton as being in possession of Welles, Finshoge, part of Ballinvalley, and Cold Harbour. Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick grants Ballinvalley to his son, Richard, in 1730, subject to a lease to Henry Bolton of part of the premises. See Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020. I consider that the Henry Bolton referred to in Volume 69 is the Henry Bolton referred to in the Doyne dealing in Volume 55, (or his heir), and is not the Henry Bolton, (another son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick), referred to in Volume 70 Page 462 Number 49051. If this assumption is correct, {as to which see (c) below}, one might draw the conclusion, from the location of the various properties described, that Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and Henry Bolton of Wells each inherited part of Ballinvalley from a common ancestor, who presumable, once held all the properties named in Volume 55 from Doyne before 1708. Ballinvalley lies between their respective holdings described in the Doyne transaction in Volume 55. Alternatively, based on my assumption as to their respective ages, (taking into account the probable age of their presumed descendants alive in the 1720's), Henry Bolton of Wells may be the father of Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick.

- (a) This dealing was before the establishment of the Register of Deeds in 1708. It has been possible to reconstruct it from the recitals to the dealing in Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942.
- (b) The grant was a lease and release, "in fee farm forever" a conveyance of the freehold.

- (c) The area of land is measured, it would seem, in Irish Plantation Acres. 196 Statute (English) acres equal 121 Irish Plantation Acres. Much confusion arises therefore, in the 19th Century when one attempts to line up the areas held at, say Griffith's Valuation of Ireland in 1852, (measured in Statute acres), with areas stated in the Irish Deeds Register. Once it is understood that a "conversion" is required from Irish Plantation acres, the areas held in 1852, make sense.
- (d) In the succeeding Notes I have provided a "translation" of Irish Plantation acres into Statute (English) acres wherever appopriate.

### COMMENTS

- (a) The dealing recites that the grantor did "demise grant let and to farm let unto Henry Bolton, his heirs and assigns, all that Ballyrea now in his possession and in the possession of his under tenants".
- (b) This dealing was registered in the Registry of Deeds on the same day, and with the succeeding number to the dealing between Doyne and William Bolton of Ballinvalley in relation to Ballinvalley. The dealing between William Bolton of Ballinvalley and Doyne was for three lives, two of whom were grandsons of

William Bolton, the grantee, by daughters, and the third was for the life of William Bolton, the eldest son of Henry Bolton, the eldest son of the grantor. See Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346. I suggest that William Bolton, son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, was born between the execution of the Ballyrea Deed by Henry Bolton of Ballyrea on the 8th February 1709/10 and the Ballinvalley Deed by William Bolton of Ballinvalley, on the 14th September 1710. It may well have been that the Ballyrea dealing related to the marriage of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea and a dowry provided by the Hatton family. In that case, it would be anticipated that Mary Bolton's brother would be included in the transaction. In later dealings with lands on the marriage, for two generations, of the senior line of the Henry Bolton of Ballyrea family, a "Hatton" is made a party to Deeds of Settlement. See Volume 201 Page 335 Number 133055, and Volume 336 Page 524 Number 226203.

(c) In the succeeding analysis of Deeds I have used the modern calendar that makes the first day of January the first day in each year, rather than the calendar in use before 1755 which had the first day of April as the first day of the year. Accordingly, in these Notes, the year in which a Deed was signed is the year now recognised as commencing on the first day of January. Thus, the subject lease, which bears on it the date of signature as the 8th February 1709, was signed, in terms of the modern calendar, on the 8th February 1710. As all Deeds are recorded in these Notes in the order of their creation, it is important that the modern terminology be adopted.

### COMMENTS

- (a) From a later dealing in 1749 with Clasheen, (Lasglassin alias Lassinglassin alias Ash Clasheen, as I suggest, as to which, see [d] below), it would seem that the "Henry Bolton" referred to is Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, the father of the first of the "William Bolton" line of "the Island". William Bolton, one of the lives set out in the subject Deed is the sole remaining life in that dealing (see Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720), and there he is described as "William Bolton of Dublin, Gentleman, son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea". It is, therefore, this Henry Bolton, and not the Richard Bolton referred to in C.K.Bolton's Book, who is the immediate progenitor of the line of "William Bolton of the Island". The mention of William Bolton as Henry Bolton's eldest son also conflicts with C.K.Bolton's Book, where William Bolton of Dublin and Island is described as a third son. However, the descriptions are consistent with all Deeds researched by me, and C.K.Bolton is demonstrably in error. The reference to William, the eldest son of Henry Bolton, puts birth before 14th September 1709/10, and not, C.K.Bolton's Book suggests, many years later.
- (b) As mentioned in Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720, the John Bolton of Ash Clasheen would, I submit, be a brother, nephew, or great nephew of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, sharing with him the common ancestor, William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the original lessee, in the subject lease, of Curratubbin, Moneydane, and Lassinglassin. William Bolton of Ballinvalley is mentioned in a Doyne Deed in Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825. At the time of the transaction in the subject Deed, and assuming that the named lives were infants, William Bolton of Ballinvalley would have to have been aged around 50 years old, that is born around 1660.
- (c) In relation to the mention of the lives of Stacey and Rowsom, I would submit that it could be implied that, as at 1710, Henry Bolton had only one son, William, and that two other very young lives were selected by William Bolton, the lessee. I have not uncovered a William Rowsom in the Deeds. However, in 1749, a Samuel Rowsom was in possession of one third of Curratubbin and Moneydane, it would appear, with a perpetual leasehold. See Volume 146 Page 114 Number 96897, and my comments thereunder. Samuel Rowsom is described as being "of Curratubbin" in 1759, see Volume 219 Page 78 Number 142717. C.K.Bolton states that Samuel Rowsom probated the will of "William Bolton, his

grandfather" in 1762. Given that William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the lessee in the subject Deed would, on my calculation, have to be over 100 years old in 1762, perhaps Samuel Rowsom probated the will of William, the son of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the lessee in the subject Deed? The Index to Wills confirms a grant of Probate in the estate of a William Bolton of Ballinvalley in 1762. Rowsom is also mentioned as a Bolton tenant in Griffith's Valuation of Ireland. I would assume that the Rowsom family took a third of Curratubbin and Moneydane by descent from their grandfather, (?), William Bolton. I have yet to locate any lease. For the conveyancing practice, generally, at the time, see Williams on Real Property, 23rd Edition.

(d) Lasglassin, the third Townland mentioned in this Deed does not appear as a Townland in Griffith's Valuations of Ireland. A dealing with "Curratubbin" in Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720, when read with Volume 205 Page 47 Number 135029 explains the "disappearance" of the townland of "Lasglassin", explaining, I would submit, the derivation of the townland of "Clasheen". In Volume 140, above, a Deed of William Bolton of Ballinvalley conveys "Ash Clasheen, being 80 acres of Curratubbin", (perhaps "Curratubbin" was the name given, generally to the whole estate), to John Bolton of Ash Clasheen. In a Marriage settlement in Volume 205, referred to above, Robert Doyne, the head tenant of Curratubbin, Moneydane and Lassinglassin, describes Lassinglassin as having the "alias" of Lassinglassen and of Clasheen. One assumes that "Lassinglassin" is synonymous with "Lasglassin", given that Lassinglassin is the third element of the farm of Curratubbin, Moneydane and Lassinglassin.

I have observed elsewhere, (see my comments on Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720), that spelling may mimic the way in which words might have been pronounced. Accordingly, I submit that "Ash", and becomes "glassin" becomes "Clasheen". Ultimately, "Ash Clasheen" is simply referred to as "Clasheen". The "modern" Clasheen, farmed by William Bolton-Lee, comprises 126 Statute (english) acres. 80 Irish Plantation acres, the area of Ash Clasheen conveyed in the dealing under review, are equal to 129 Statute acres!

(e) In other Deeds there are references to Henry Bolton, Senior, of Wells etc, who has dealings with Henry Bolton Junior. See Volume 35 Page 279 Number 22436. The latter is also referred to as "Junior" in a Deed with Doyne. See Volume 47 Page 98 Number 29642. It is clear from the fact that land held by Henry Bolton Senior ultimately ends up in Henry Bolton Junior's hands, that they are closely related. Thus, in the absence of other evidence I would have assumed that Henry Bolton Senior was the father of Henry Bolton Junior. This hypothesis cannot be correct for the following reasons:

- (i) In the subject Deed Henry Bolton is described as the **son** of William Bolton, the grantee, and the **father** of William Bolton one of the named lives.
- (ii) In the 1749 lease from William Bolton of Ballinvalley to John Bolton of Ash Clasheen, described as "part of Curratubbin", William Bolton, one of the lives set out in the subject deed, is, by 1749, the sole remaining life, and there he is described as "William Bolton of Dublin, Gentleman, son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea", that is, the son of the Henry Bolton described as the eldest son of William Bolton in the subject Deed. See Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720.

Accordingly, an hypothesis consistent with close family relationships evidenced by the succession to key lands is that Henry Bolton Senior is the **grandfather** of Henry Bolton, Junior. Further support for the close relationships between the Ballinvalley and Ballyrea families may be seen by the fact that Henry Bolton was a named life in a lease renewal to William Bolton of Ballinvalley by Doyne in 1758. See Volume 196 Page 9 Number 128888. Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, an old man by 1758, would, I suggest, have been one of the **original named lives**, possibly from as early as before 1708.

Were this so, one might infer that the grant to William Bolton of Ballinvalley referred to in Volume 196 referred to above may well have been first made to Henry Bolton of Wells for the lives of his children, whom, I suggest, would have included William Bolton (later of Ballinvalley, the lessee in the subject Deed,) and Henry Bolton (later of Ballyrea, the named life in Volume 196 referred to above). Further research should be undertaken to find whether there are other dealings with Ballinvalley and Curratubbin.

The Deed is a Deed of Assignment. The Deed recites that

"in consideration of the sum of £120 paid and bonded by Henry Hatton for Margaret Rowsom to esquire and Tottenham other causes considerations, (Margaret Rowsom) did grant assign and set over to Henry Hatton all the town and lands of Cooltrundle being mortgaged to the said Samuel Rowsom by Robert Sunderland by Deed of Lease and Release dated the 10th and 11th January 1698, (ie 10th January 1699), for £200 together with the said Deeds to be held by the said Henry Hatton until the principal of £200 together with lawful interest is paid to the said Henry Hatton in one payment".

The document would seem to be a mortgage of the mortgagee's interests, (ie Rowsom's interests), in the original mortgage from Sunderland. However, Cooltrundle is still in Hatton hands over 40 years later. See Volume 155 Page 255 Number 104493. Perhaps the conveyance to Rowsom by Sunderland was an absolute conveyance, clothed as a mortgage, to avoid an estate tail, and perhaps, similarly, the conveyance to Hatton is an absolute one. (b) Are Rowsom and Hatton related? Note, too, that Henry Bolton married Mary Hatton who, I would suggest, is the sister of this Henry Hatton. Note, too, that Mary Bolton's father in law, William Bolton, is the grandfather of a William Rowsom, whose brother, I assume, is the Samuel Rowsom who, as C.K.Bolton suggests, probated a William Bolton's Will in 1762. It should be recalled, too, that, according to the Hollingsworth papers, an Ann Rowsom of Tomagaddy was named in the Will of Margaret Fossey, the widow of Daniel Fossey.

(c) There is no townland of Ballyconnow mentioned in Griffith. There is, however, a "Ballyconnick". In the light of the comments in (b), above, it should be noted that Daniel Fossey of Ballyconnick married Elizabeth Grundy, also of Ballyconnick.

### COMMENTS

- (a) This dealing has been reconstructed from the recitals to the dealing in Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942. Neither a search of the Townland Index nor the Lessors' Index has turned up a registered lease.
- (b) I would assume that Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick had infant sons at the time of creation of this lease. Otherwise, on the evidence of the way in which families worked the leases as family groups, he would have not leased the land to a stranger. The lease to his second son, Richard Bolton Junior, set out in Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942, coupled with Richard Junior joining him in a Deed in 1725, but not in a Deed in 1723, (see Volume 38 Page 42 Number 23716 and Volume 53 Page 221 Number 35167) would suggest that Richard Bolton Junior was born around 1702. Were Richard Bolton, Junior, "of age", (that is, 21 years old), in 1723 he would, presumably have had to join in the Deed referred to in Volume 38 with his father and eldest brother, Edward, who must have already reached his majority by 1723. See my comments to Volume 38 mentioned above, and the conveyancing practice discussed there.

### COMMENTS

- (a) On the basis of other dealings, see Volume 47 Page 98 Number 29642, Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346, Volume 64 Page 66 Number 42636, I consider that Henry Bolton Senior was the grandfather of Henry Bolton Junior, and that William Bolton of Ballinvalley, a witness to this dealing, was the son of Henry Bolton, senior. In a Doyne dealing listing various properties leased out to tenants, "Henry Bolton" is referred to as holding Wells , Finshoge, part of Ballinvalley, and Coldharbour. See Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825. I suggest that the "Henry Bolton" referred to in Volume 55 above is Henry Bolton, Senior, not Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. I suggest that Abraham Bolton of Ballinvalley would have been another son of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, that is, a brother of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea.
- (b) Note that Abraham Bolton of Ballinvalley was a witness to a Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick Deed, (see Volume 32 Page 31 Number 18982), thus adding weight to the suggestion that William Bolton of Ballinvalley, Abraham Bolton of Ballinvalley, and Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick were brothers, that is, sons of Henry Bolton of Ballyduffbeg, (and of Welles, Finshoge, part of Ballinvalley, and Coldharbour), the grantor of the subject lease.
- (c) If Henry Bolton of Ballyduffbeg is the common ancestor of the Ballinvalley and Kilpatrick families, he would, (based on our assumed date of birth for William Bolton of Ballinvalley at around 1660), have to have been born around 1640. Such a birth date is not out of range. See my comments at Volume 47 Page 98

Number 29642.

- (d) The subject lease recites that the grant is made pursuant to a head lease from the "late Chief Justice Doyne" as head landlord. As Chief Justice Doyne died in 1733, the reference to "the late Chief Justice" is a reference to Doyne's former Office, not to his death before 1720.
- (e) Burke, in the General Armory and in Landed Gentry of Ireland, claims that Bolton of Island shares the same arms as Bolton of Bective Abbey, County Meath and formerly of Brazeel, Dublin, and Bolton of Tullydonnell County Louth, namely "or, on a chev. qu. three lions couchant ar". These other Bolton families are both descended from Sir Richard Bolton, Lord Chancellor of Ireland, (in the 1640's), who Burke claims to be the son of John Bolton of Great Fenton in Staffordshire, England. According to Burke, Sir Richard had other sons whose lines are not traced by him. Given the notorious inaccuracies in Burke in relation both to Arms and to Descent, could it be possible that the Wexford Bolton family are descended from a son of Sir Richard Bolton? If it is possible to view the actual Deeds held in the Registry of Deeds at Dublin, the "seal" of the various Wexford Bolton namebearers to Deeds may reveal a Coat of Arms. I would not, however, draw so long a bow as to suggest a connection with Bolton landholders in Wexford leasing from Chief Justice Doyne, and a possible association of Chief Justice Doyne with Dublin Bolton namebearers who were lawyers descended from Sir Richard Bolton the Lord Chancellor. Nevertheless, further research into the descendants of Sir Richard Bolton, the Lord Chancellor, should be undertaken.

- The dealings comprise a lease and release, that is, a (a) conveyance of the freehold.
- The price is expressed as being £507, in consideration for which Parsons transfers the lands to Richard Bolton, his heirs and assigns forever.
- further covenant requires a payment of £2/10/-, (C) (presumably annually), which sum was "chiefly the land's proportion of the Crown Rents of the Manors of Tomduff and Glascarrick whereof the said lands are part"
- (d) Further covenants require "the said Richard Bolton, his heirs and assigns, tenants, and servants to do suile (sic ?), and service to the Courts to be held for the Manor of Tomduff, and to grind at the present Manor Mill". These covenants in relation to the Manor of Tomduff seem to be a hangover from the time of the Manorial Courts of feudal times, abolished, in England, long before 1721. Subsequent dealings by Richard Bolton with these freeholds do not incorporate these "manorial" covenants.
- The witness Abraham Bolton is stated as being of Ballinvalley. Richard Bolton was the proprietor of the lease of Crane Kilpatrick and Ballinvalley, (see Irish Deed Register Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020 where the 1702 lease to Richard Bolton from Doyne is recited). It will be recalled that William Bolton, father of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, was also of "Ballinvalley", (see Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346). Of which family is this Abraham Bolton a member? Probate was granted in the estate of an Abraham Bolton of Ballinvalley in 1753. (Index to Ferns Wills). C.K.Bolton and Burke identify only an Abraham Bolton of Ballinvalley, born in 1723. Further research might reveal his identity and relationship.

COMMENTS The Deed is cast in the form of a lease and release. This means of conveyance was one of the methods used to confer freehold title. The lease created the entry by the lessee, and the release, dated a day later, but invariably executed at the same time, extinguished the lessor's equity of redemption. This conveyancing device was also used to create mortgages. In the light of a note in the margin of the Deeds Register in relation

to this transaction which records the repayment of the Mortgage debt, "as appears by the mortgagee's certificate dated the 14th June 1729", this dealing was a Mortgage and not an absolute conveyance of the freehold. The Deed provided for redemption on the payment of the sum of £250 plus lawful interest on the 2nd September 1722, the usual method of providing for a retransfer of the freehold estate to the mortgagee on repayment of the loan. Such a provision was required in view of the rule in equity concerning the right of redemption of the mortgage being vested in the mortgagor. The date for redemption set out in the Deed would not necessarily be the true date for repayment, such true date being a matter between the parties. The convention was to recite a repayment date, usually six months from the date of the loan. For further details, generally, of the conveyancing practice at the time, see T. Cyprian Williams Williams on Real Property, 23rd Edition, 1920, Sweet & Maxwell, London.

### COMMENTS

(a) The lease is in perpetuity, being a "demise grant let and to farm let to Peter Fossey his heirs and assigns for the three

named lives "or such other persons that successively forever hereafter shall be added in the place and stead of such of the said lives as should happen to die as hereinafter contained...."
(b) The townland is the "Raheenmore" adjoining Ballyduff, the townland adjoining Garrynew, which adjoins Ballylusk, the property later farmed by Fossey Bolton. Another Raheenmoor adjoins Ballylusk on its western side. The detailed descriptions of the metes and bounds of the townland of Raheenmore in this dealing clearly identifies it as the property lying to the south of Ballylusk.

- (c) This Peter Fossey is described in the Hollingsworth Papers as being the son of Daniel Fossey, a soldier of the Commonwealth who obtained land in Wexford in 1661. O'Hart mentions Daniel Fossey as a member of the Commonwealth Army in Irish Genealogy. (d) Peter Fossey renewed the lease in 1736 substituting the lives of John Morris, son of Peter Morris deceased, and Peter Colburn, son of John Colburn, for his own life and that of W.W.Dockrill, son of Benjamin Dockrill. See Volume 101 Page 516 Page 71497. A further 17 acres of Raheenmore was acquired in 1737, with Benjamin Fossey, Peter Coleburn, and Hester Fossey, the daughter of Peter Fossey, the Grantee being the named lives. See Volume 101 Page 556 Number 71706. Byron Edwards has suggested that Peter Fossey's wife may have been a sister or daughter of Benjamin Dockrill. Note that her only son was called "Benjamin". The Morris and Coleburn names occur as witnesses to a number of Deeds. No doubt all of these families were closely related to Peter Fossey or to his wife.
- (e) It is submitted that the Hester Fossey mentioned in (d) married John Tackaberry of Tomagaddy, and their son, Fossey Tackaberry, was the father of Mary Tackaberry who, it is submitted, married Henry Bolton of Cullentra. See Ferns Marriage Licences for the licence issued to Henry Bolton and Mary Tackaberry in 1793. We know that Fossey Bolton was, indeed, the son of Henry Bolton of Cullentra. See Volume 724 Page 514 Number 494849, where he witnessed a Deed in 1818. At the 1861 Census for the Isle of Man, Fossey Bolton gave his age at 64, that is born in 1797, and his birthplace at Monamolin, Wexford.
- (f) A search of the records of the Society of Friends, (MF 571398), shows that Daniel Fossey, of Ballyconnick, married Elizabeth Grundy, of Ballyconnick, at Old Booby on the 27th April 1689. Elizabeth Fossey's death is recorded on the 19th January 1692. Daniel Fossey of Wexford is recorded as marrying Margaret Bevan, or Bevin, of Raheen, County Wexford, at Forrest, on the 7th May 1698. The death of Daniel Fossey, husband of Elizabeth, is recorded at Corlican, on the 11th May 1703. If the Daniel Fossey named in the various records was one and the same person, I would assume that he would have been described at his death as the husband of Margaret, not of Elizabeth. I submit,

therefore, that Daniel Fossey, the husband of Elizabeth Grundy may have been the father of Daniel Fossey, husband of Margaret Norma Stilwell has drawn my attention to Hollingsworth papers, wherein it is stated that Margaret Fossey, in her Will, refers to her cousin Ann Rowsom of Tomagaddy.

Note too, that Margaret Bevin is stated as being of Raheen. Is this the Raheen in the possession of Margaret Rowsom before or around 1708, (see Volume 55 Page 255 number 36825), or is it a shortened version of Raheenmore or Raheenbeg in the possession of the Fossey family? There are no other references to any Fossey family name bearers in the Society of Friends records searched by me.

- (g) The Hollingsworth Papers state that John Tackaberry obtained a lease of 168 acres of Tomagaddy in 1738, and that the lease was not registered until 1771, almost 20 years after John Tackaberry's death. His sons Benjamin and Fossey attested the registration of the 1738 Lease in 1771. David Goodall, in The Freemen of Wexford in 1776, states that Tomagaddy leases were renewed to various Tackaberry family members, including Fossey Tackaberry. I have not yet searched these Tackaberry leases. I have recorded a Deed of 1749 whereby John Tackaberry of Tomagaddy leased 70 acres or thereabouts of Ballynesilloge to Robert Tackaberry. See Volume 137 Page 311 Number 93442.
- (h) A Henry Bolton was shown as farming 114 acres of Raheenmore at the Griffith Valuation of Ireland, in 1852. Could Raheenmore have come into the Bolton family as a result of the chain of descent suggested in (e) above? Query, too, whether it is the same Raheenmore. Further research into the disposition of Raheenmore after 1738 should be undertaken.

The Deed also recites that Calcott Chambre has the rights to the land, woods, pastures .... in as large and ample a manner as was held by George Chambre deceased. The Deed makes it clear that there are four Calcot Chambre namebearers: Calcot Chambre of Ballymuragh, the Grantee, Captain Calcot Chambre, late of Athy and now of Dublin, Calcot Chambre, son of Captain Calcott Chambre, and Calcot Chambre, son of Mastorson (?) Chambre of Rahinconor, County Wexford. Clearly they are brothers and/or cousins. Presumably Calcott Chambre, the grantee, is the son or grandson of George Chambre, the former holder of Ballymurragh lease. Ballymurragh is in the possession of William Bolton of the Island by 1811. See Volume 633 Page 439 Number 436052.

COMMENTS The Deed recites that the conveyance is made in consideration of the sum of £250 paid to Richard Bolton by Henry Archer. It would appear that the Kilmihill property was

entailed, for it was necessary for Edward Bolton, "eldest son and heir apparent", to join in the Deed. Landed families attempted for hundreds of years to ensure that land would be kept in the family and that it would descend over the centuries from father to eldest son. Through the development of several legal fictions, and the way in which the Statute of Uses was interpreted by the Courts, it became possible for the person who was the subject of the estate tail to defeat it, once the heir to that person attained his majority. Accordingly, Edward Bolton must have attained the age of 21 years by 1723, placing his birth at or around 1702, or, as C.K.Bolton suggests, as early as 1696, that is: "Born at Kilpatrick County Wexford in 1696, entered Dublin University in 1714/1715, {ie 1715}, aged 19, having prepared at Mr Sheridan's in Dublin. He was the son of Richard Bolton, a colonus".

It was also the practice to renew leases from generation to generation, substituting the next generation of lives, for example, the son of the original grantee, his wife, and the grandchild of the original grantee, thus attempting to ensure the continuance of the entailment. Perhaps there was a renewal of the Bolton grant of Kilmihill before 1702. In 1702, for example, Richard Bolton purchased the freehold of Kilpatrick, Crane, and Ballinvalley. In the Recitals, the Deed refers to the Statute of Uses, and provides for redemption on the payment of £500 as a "penalty" if the right of redemption is exercised. In the light of the fact that a "penalty" could not clog the equity of redemption of a Mortgage, it is suggested that this transaction might not be a mortgage, but an absolute conveyance. However, a dealing between Bolton, Archer, and Davis at Volume 60 Page 405 Number 41663 suggests that this dealing is a Mortgage. See my comments on Volume 30 Page 430 Number 19044 in relation to the law regarding Mortgages. See Williams on Real Property 23rd Edition, for a further discussion, generally, on estates tail, the practice used to create them, and the means used to defeat them.

The Deed recites that the consideration is £111/3/2, and sets out that a "penalty" of £223/5/4 is payable should Richard Bolton's heirs attempt to redeem the property. I cannot say from the Deed Register extract whether this dealing is a Mortgage or an absolute conveyance. (see my comments in relation to Volume 30 Page 430 Number 19044, and Volume 38 Page 42 Number 23716). There is no marginal notation that any mortgage has been discharged. Later dealings referred to in the Index to the Register of Deeds refer to many "Bolton to Bolton" dealings in relation to Ballyduff. Indeed, a Richard Bolton holds Ballyduff at Griffith, Valuation of Ireland, a hundred and twenty years later. Further, in 1731, at Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942, Richard Bolton, Senior conveys the title to Ballyduff to Richard Bolton, Junior. I consider, therefore, that the present dealing is a Mortgage.

## COMMENTS

- (a) The Deed is described as a Deed of Lease, "grant farm let .... "The term runs from the 25th March 1725. The Deed replaces the Deed dated the 8th February 1709/10, (see Volume 28 Page 220 Number 17374), substituting the lives of Elizabeth Goodwin and William Bolton, the son of the present grantee, for the lives of Mary Bolton, (Hatton) and John Hatton, the wife and brother in law, respectively, of the 1710 grantee. May it be assumed, therefore that the lives replaced have died? Who is Elizabeth Goodwin? Could she be a proposed second wife of the grantee, or is she a granddaughter? See (c) below.
- (b) The Deed, as well as replacing the 1709/1710 lease of Ballyrea, adds Ballyshancarragh, in Griffith's Valuation of Ireland called "Ballyshane", for an additional annual rental of £10/0/-.
- (c) The Deed refers to Henry Bolton as "Junior". In the light of the fact that I consider it well established from other Deeds, (see Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346), that Henry Bolton of Ballyreagh (sic) is the son of the William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the party to the 1710 dealing in Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346, could the reference to Henry Bolton as "Junior" imply that his grandfather was Henry Bolton, Senior? See my comments in relation to Volume 35 Page 279 Number 22436, where there is a dealing between Henry Bolton Senior, of Ballyduffbeg, and Henry Bolton, Junior, of Ballyreagh. Certainly, the naming convention of the time would support the view that Henry, the eldest son of William, would be named after William's father. Could it also be implied that:
  - (i) Henry Bolton Senior had the original 1709 Grant of Ballyreagh, in which case the Hatton family's relationships would have to be revised; and/or
    - (ii) that Henry Bolton Senior was alive at the execution of this time of Deed. C.K.Bolton refers to Will a of Henry Bolton of Ballyduff of 1730. Could the Will of Henry Bolton, Senior? If so he would have to be around 90 years of age, not an impossibility. See Volume 35 Page 279 Number 22436.

However, on balance, I would consider that Henry Bolton of the 1710 lease is one and the same as Henry Bolton junior referred to in the subject lease.

- (a) The lease runs from the 25th March 1727 for 35 years. The property, "Ballyduff", included in the lease, is, I suggest, the small townland in the Barony of Ballagheen containing 87 acres, which adjoins Ballyedmond and Courtballyedmond, and lies directly to the north of Cool Harbour. It is clearly not the "Ballyduff" referred to in dealings between Richard Bolton Senior and others between 1705 and 1731. (see Volume 53 Page 221 Number 35167, and Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942). That "Ballyduff" is, I suggest, that part of Upper and Lower Ballyduff, Barony of Ballagheen, Parish of Ardamine, near Tomduff, the property of William Parsons, the vendor of the freehold of Ballyduff to Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick, in 1705. "Ballyduff House", according to the ordnance survey, was erected on Lower and Upper Ballyduff, which adjoin Raheenmore and Garrynew. There are several other townlands called "Ballyduff", but they are in other Baronies. "Ballyduff", in the Barony of Gorey, is found in two Parishes, Ballycanew and Monamolin, with areas of 182 acres, and 90 acres, respectively.
- (c) The dealing provides no clue as to the identity of this Henry Bolton. Is he Henry Bolton of Ballyreagh, progenitor of the William Bolton of the Island line, or is he a son of Henry Bolton of Ballyreagh, or is he a younger son of Richard Bolton,

Senior, of Kilpatrick, (see Volume 53 Page 221 Number 35167), or is he the Henry Bolton, Senior, referred to by implication in Volume 47 Page 98 Number 26942, and named as "of Ballyedmond" in Volume 35 Page 279 Number 22436. Clearly, he is not a stranger.

- (i) Ballynestrane, Coolbeg, and Tirro, containing 421 acres, [682 English (Statute) acres] in the possession of Jonas Archer
- (j) Kilpatrick, Crane, and Part of Ballinvalley, containing 335 acres, [542 English (Statute) acres] in the possession of Richard Bolton
- (k) Wells , Finshoge, Part of Ballinvalley, and Cold Harbour, containing 496 acres, [803 English (Statute) acres] in the possession of Henry Bolton
- (1) Ballyreagh, containing 109 acres, [176 English (Statute) acres] in the possession of Samuel Oates

- (1) The above lands are all recited as being lands "formerly in the tenure or possession of ...." . It is clear from other Deeds recorded in my research, that the lands were in the <u>actual</u> tenure or possession of at least some of the tenants named. For example, see the dealing with Kilpatrick Crane and Ballinvalley on the 11th August 1702 where Doyne conveyed the estate in those townlands to Richard Bolton Senior.
- (2) The subject dealing is entered into in 1728. Searches of the Index to the Register of Deeds do not disclose leases from Doyne to Henry Bolton of Wells , etc, Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick etc, and William Bolton of Ballinvalley after 1708 and before 1727. The conclusion must be drawn, therefore, that the leases granted to these Bolton name bearers, recited in the subject 1728 Doyne Deed, must have been entered into before 1708. Further evidence of the age of the leases recited may be gathered from
  - (a) the reference to Ballyrea, said to be in the possession of Samuel Oates: the lease of Ballyrea was conveyed by Doyne to Henry Bolton, farmer, on the 8th February 1710, (see Volume 28 Page 220

Number 17347), and was held by Henry Bolton in 1727. Clearly the lease to Simon Oates was before 1710; and

(b) the reference to Curraghtubbin, Lassinglassen, containing 262 acres, said to be in the possession of Aaron Smyth: clearly the lease to Aaron Smyth was before 1710, for, by lease dated the 14th September 1710, Doyne conveyed the lease of these townlands to William Bolton of Ballinvalley. See Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346

It is on the basis of evidence such as this that I have, in dealing with the history of ownership of various townlands, "reconstructed" the temporal sequence of the lease holding of such townlands.

COMMENTS The Register of Deeds refers to several Deeds between Henry Archer and John Davis leasing and releasing 100 acres of (lower) Kilmihill and Warrens, and recites the Bolton to Archer lease and release of 25th and 26th June 1723, (Volume 38 Page 42 Number 23715). Henry Archer's son Richard and his wife Grace are joined in a tripartite Deed between Henry Archer, John Davis and the Boltons mentioned above. The gist of all the conveyancing jargon is that the Archer Mortgage of 1723 for £250 is being paid out by John Davis, ("in consideration for the sum of 349 shillings paid to Archer by Davis..."), and the Bolton family, on the increased security of Upper Kilmihill, are to get a further advance from Davis of £157/0/11. This dealing reinforces my view that the 1723 dealing with Archer, in Volume 38 Page 42 Number 23715), was a mortgage and not an absolute conveyance. Note the "consideration" paid to Archer by Davis was 349/-, hardly the value of 100 acres. The Deeds with Davis provide, too, that the equity of redemption may be exercised on payment of £500 within a year together with lawful interest. The sum of £500 was referred to in the dealing between Archer and Bolton at Volume 38 Page 42 Number 23715. See my comments in relation to conveyancing practice at that reference.

### COMMENTS

(a) This Deed seems to recite the rent, and lives, as above set out, as if the Deed repeats what is in an existing lease. It seems to be a Deed of Variation of that lease, for it goes on to provide, after reciting the terms for renewal on the falling in of a life, that, in consideration of the sum of £60, Richard Sealey grants a "free" life to be substituted for any of the named lives should any of them die before the 29th September 1732, and further provides that Sealey grants to Henry Bolton and his heirs the "wood, timber, trees, plants, and shrubs" ...etc, with liberty to carry them away.

In a normal lease for farming purposes there was no right conferred on a tenant to use the natural improvements growing on the land. See Williams on Real Property 23rd Edition for further information on the reservations to the landlord. As Williams points out, although the category of lease which was renewable in perpetuity was almost the equivalent of freehold, in important respects, such as the reservation of timber, minerals, etc, the landlord maintained an important interest in the land. Also, of course, by the system of "fines" on the replacement of a "life" in a lease, the tenant remained financially vulnerable. At a much later time, the practice of requiring a fine was abolished by Statute, although the right of the landlord to reservation of timber and minerals, etc, was not, at first, discontinued.

Ultimately, a tenant was permitted, by Statute, to require a landlord to "sell" the landlord's reservations in the land to the tenant. Thus, for all intents and purposes, the tenant acquired the freehold title. This is, undoubtedly, how the descendants of Fossey Bolton, and, presumably of William Bolton of Clasheen, have come to "own" the freehold of their farms.

(b) I assume that the witness, "William Bolton of Dublin, Gentleman", is William Bolton the eldest son of Henry Bolton of Ballyreagh, (sic). William Bolton of Dublin appears as a witness to many later dealings with land by Henry Bolton of Ballyreagh.

- (a) The dealing is the assignment by Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick of the lease of the 11th August 1702 from Doyne to him over Kilpatrick, Crane and Ballinvalley. The dealing recites that the purpose of the Dealing is for William Bolton to enjoy Crane and Ballinvalley, with remainder to William Bolton of Kilpatrick and "his heirs and assigns forever", subject to the life estate of the grantor, Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, and a rent charge over Kilpatrick of £10 per annum for the life of Grace, the wife of the grantor, after the grantor's death. From the dealing, "heirs and assigns forever", it can be seen that the 1702 lease from Doyne must be renewable in perpetuity.
- (b) Part of Ballinvalley conveyed by this dealing is expressed to be subject to a lease to Henry Bolton. The epitome of the dealing in the Register of Deeds does not give a description of Henry Bolton sufficient for us to be able to identify him. See the problems of identification discussed at Volume 64 Page 66 Number 42636. However, for the reasons I set out in my comments to Volume 79 Page 70 Number 54617, I consider that this Henry Bolton could possibly be Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, and not Henry Bolton, the son of Richard Bolton, Senior. No clue is given as to the area of Henry Bolton's leased area, or of the period of the lease.
- (c) See my comment at Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942 in relation to the witness, George Annesley. He is the husband of Anne, sister to William Bolton, the grantee.

The only townland of "Ballyduff" in the Barony of Ballagheen contains 87 acres. See my comments on Volume 64 Page 66 Number 42636. This property, therefore, must be part of lower and upper Ballyduff, the only other property in Ballagheen that can satisfy the description of "Ballyduff". This view is strengthened by the fact that "Ballyduff House" is shown, on the ordnance survey of 1833, to be on the townland of Lower Ballyduff, Barony of Ballagheen. See Volume 64 Page 66 Number 461334.
- (b) The Deed further recites that, by a Deed dated the 9th March 1727, Richard Bolton, Senior, had made over and leased Ballyduff to Richard Bolton, Junior. The Deed goes on to say that Richard Senior, (sells) to Richard Bolton, Bolton, Junior, title...etc to Ballyduff, subject to a lease granted by Richard Bolton, Senior, to William Porter of Tomagaddy for a term of 21 years from 1713.
- (c) This dealing makes it clear that the dealing between Bolton and Chamney in relation to Ballyduff in 1725 was a mortgage. See Volume 53 Page 221 Number 35167.

- (d) Note the witness, George Annesley is said, in C.K.Bolton's Book, to be the husband of Ann, a sister of the first William Bolton of the "Island" line. She is clearly not, for, based on the fact that George Annesley witnesses many Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick dealings, and none of the Henry Bolton of Ballyrea dealings, she is, surely, the sister of Edward, William, Richard, and Henry Bolton, the sons of Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick, and his wife Grace.
- (e) Hugh Roberts is, I assume, the same Hugh Roberts who "purchased" the lease of Crane from William Bolton of Ballinvalley, son of Richard Bolton, senior, in 1734. See Volume 80 Page 174 Number 55400.

Perhaps this conveyance to Henry Bolton of Carrigg is made as part of a marriage portion consequent on his marriage to Elizabeth (perhaps Nixon), perhaps the daughter of the recited George Nixon of Newtowne. Presumably the Mortgage to Davis has been paid out, partly with the £200 recited as having been paid by Henry Bolton of Carrigg to Richard Bolton, Senior. Presumably the "natural love and affection" of Richard Bolton, Senior towards Henry Bolton of Carrigg, (referred to in the recitals to the Deed as his son), extended to him discharging the balance of the debt owing to John Davis on the Mortgage referred to at Volume 60 Page 405 Number 41663.

The subject Deed is, effectively, a declaration of trust by William Bolton stating that he purchased the land as trustee for John Hatton. When this Deed ultimately registered in 1747 Jack Hatton, Extraordinary in Chancery swore that he knew the signature of Henry Bolton and that the Henry Bolton who witnessed the Deed in 1733/1734 was one and the same as the Henry Bolton who swore the memorial. As Loftus Hatton, whom I presume, was the brother of John Hatton, had been Mayor of Wexford Town in 1734, (see: The Freemen of Wexford in 1776, at page 322, David Goodall. Irish Genealogist Volume 5), I suggest that the families put William Bolton's name forward as the purchaser of the land owned by the Town. One cannot comment on the propriety of what went on at this distance. There is, of course, other evidence of William Bolton acting as a "dummy" for a Hatton family member. See Volume 155 Page 255 Number 104493. A Mary Hatton was the wife of "Henry Bolton, farmer, of Ballyrea". See Volume 28 Page 220 Number 17347. I have suggested elsewhere that this Henry Bolton was the Henry Bolton Junior referred to in a later dealing with the townland of Ballyrea. See Volume 47 Page 98 Number 29642. If this is so, Henry Bolton and his son, William Bolton were assisting either the John Hatton referred to in Volume 28 Page 220 Number 17347 as the brother in law of Henry Bolton, or, perhaps another John Hatton, first cousin to William Bolton. (See Volume 76 Page 498 Number 55595. Note that a Henry Hatton is a witness to the subject Deed.

The transaction appears to be an absolute conveyance.
- (b) Can sons of Richard Bolton, the brother of the grantor, be the witnesses? On the available evidence, they would be too young. If so, who, then, are these witnesses? George Annesley of Dublin is the brother in law of the grantor.
- (c) Note my comments in relation to a transaction between William Bolton, the Grantor, and Moore and Jones on the 28th October 1734, (Volume 79 Page 70 Number 54617), which, on the face of it, seems to deal with Crane.

- (a) The Deed recites the consideration of £140/0/- for which the Grantor does "give grant bargain sell assign transfer and make over" the property to the grantees. There is nothing in the Deed to indicate whether the transaction is a Mortgage or an absolute conveyance. There is no mention of an equity of redemption, nor is there a mention of the grantees' heirs and assigns. A much later dealing in the Deed Register in relation to Kilpatrick is between Doyne, (the ultimate landlord of William Bolton), and Moore and Jones. This would suggest that the conveyance was, indeed, an absolute conveyance and not a mortgage. However, as William Bolton seems to have already, (19th July 1734, Volume 80 Page 174 Number 55400), conveyed absolute title in Crane to Hugh Roberts, I cannot understand how he can be conveying either the legal estate or a mortgage in Crane to Moore and Jones three months later!! What I suspect has happened is that the clerk who made the epitome of this dealing for the Register of Deeds misread the recitals to the Deed. The recitals would undoubtedly have stated something like.... "whereas Robert Doyne had originally granted Crane, Kilpatrick, and Ballinvalley to Richard Bolton, Senior"
- (b) The townlands are stated to be in the Barony of Ballagheen. Thus Ballinvalley is the small townland between Kilpatrick, Cool

Harbour, and Ballyrea. I suggest that the "part" of Ballinvalley not conveyed by William Bolton in his dealing with Moore and Jones is the other part of Ballinvalley, Barony of Ballagheen, conveyed to Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond by Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, and described as "Coldharbour, otherwise Finshoge Ballinvalley". See my comments on Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020, Volume 135 Page 132 Number 90719, and Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565.

- (c) The witness "George Annesley of Kilpatrick" is undoubtedly the husband of Anne Bolton, the daughter of the Grantor.
- (d) The witness, "Jack Hatton" could be the Jack Hatton referred to in The Irish Genealogist", Volume 5, (supra), at page 323, as "an attorney from Dublin", and a member of the Hatton family descended from Thomas Hatton of Gorey. Henry Bolton, farmer, of Ballyrea married Mary Hatton, presumably a member of this Hatton family. See my comments at Volume 28 Page 220 Number 17347, at Volume 76 Page 498 Number 55595, and at Volume 125 Page 488 Number 85822. It was this Jack Hatton who swore that he knew the signature of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea in Volume 125 Page 488 Number 85822.

(a) The father of Henry Hatton, Thomas Hatton, is said, in The Irish Genealogist, to have married Esther Cambey. (sic). Could this be Chambre alias Chambers) Henry Bolton, farmer, of Ballyrea married Mary Hatton. Does this dealing provide evidence of Mary Bolton's (Hatton), relationship to Thomas Hatton, the father of Henry Hatton. The will of Henry Hatton mentions his

sons Loftus, (eldest), John, Henry, and George. In the <u>Irish Genealogist</u>, Volume 5, at page 321, it is stated that he married around 1700. If this date is correct he could not have been the father of Mary Hatton who was married to Henry Bolton of Ballyrea as at 1710. Perhaps Mary was the daughter of another son of Thomas Hatton, or, more likely, a daughter of Thomas Hatton himself. Henry Hatton, inherited Clonard, Parish of St Peters. A John Hatton was a "life" in the Deed leasing Ballyrea to Henry Bolton of Ballyrea in 1709/10. See Volume 28 Page 220 Number 17347. A later trustee of a Bolton Marriage Settlement, John Hatton, is described as being of "Newbay". See Volume 201 Page 335 Number 133055. Newbay is in the Parish of St Peters, and <u>adjoins</u> Clonard. Further research should enable John and Mary Hatton, the lives in the Ballyrea Deed of 1709/10, to be identified.

Dockrill, son of Benjamin Dockrill. I have not been able to trace further renewals or assignments of this or any other Peter Fossey Leases granted in the 1730's. - (1) The lease is renewable forever on payment of a fine of £1 consequent on the falling in of a life. I have not been able to trace any renewal. As it is important to establish whether Peter Fossey's daughter married John Tackaberry, further checking of the Index to Names and Townlands should be undertaken.
- (2) Note that the subscribing witnesses are Bolton family members. The first is Richard, of Ballyduffe, who could have been Richard Bolton the younger from the Kilpatrick, Crane and Ballinvalley family, or, possibly, the Richard Bolton Ballyduff who witnessed a Deed of William Bolton Ballinvalley. (see Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720). The second witness is William Bolton, of Dublin, who is probably the son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. Richard Bolton also attended at the Register of Deeds in Dublin to register the dealing on the 22nd June 1741. Is this Richard Bolton "of Ballyduffe" the Richard Bolton of the Kilpatrick and Ballyduffe line, or is he a Richard Bolton of Balluduffe, (the small townland near Ballyduffbeg) in the possession of the Bolton families descended, as I suggest, from Henry Bolton of Wells? If the original Deeds are able to be searched at the Register of Deeds in Dublin, we ought to be able to identify the various "Richard Bolton" namebearers from their signatures.

- (1) The Deed seems to be an internal Doyne dealing, with William Bolton being used as a trustee. Note the reference to Deborah Doyne being formerly Annesley. Note that Ann Bolton, a daughter of Richard Bolton of Ballyrea married an Annesley. Could it be that Deborah Annesley is a Bolton family member, for example, the granddaughter of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, and, if so, a second (?) cousin of William Bolton, the party to this Deed. A close family relationship such as this would explain William Bolton's participation in an internal Doyne family dealing as a trustee. It might also explain how the Bolton family seemed to improve its holding of Doyne lands over the century, presumably at the expense of other tenants! The Deed recites that Robert Doyne's father and grandfather, by a Deed of 1731, had settled certain townlands on Deborah Annesley to provide her with an annuity of £300, and that Robert Doyne had since raised a mortgage of £4000 on his various townlands. Deborah was being asked to assent to such mortgage so far as it affected the lands charged with her annuity. The purpose of joining William Bolton in this Deed seems to be to ensure that Deborah's annuity of £300 (presumably subject to the mortgagee's rights), would continue to be paid each year through the vehicle of William Bolton enforcing her rights, presumably against her husband, if necessary. It will be recalled that, in general terms, a married woman normally stood in a subservient role in relation to her husband so far as concerned property and economic matters during her married life. Presumably the subject Deed was to ensure that her personal rights granted under the 1731 Deed were preserved, by allowing a male trustee, William Bolton, to sue on her behalf.

- (a) The Deed is a renewal of a lease, presumably, to replace a deceased named life, or lives. I have not been able to find the lease that this dealing replaces. The lease is, certainly not a lease of new lands to the Bolton interests. Finshoge, part of Ballinvalley and Coldharbour were in the possession of a Henry Bolton, presumably, before 1708, (see my comments to Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825). By a Deed dated the 17th May 1720, Henry Bolton senior conveyed his interest in Finshoge to Henry Bolton, Junior. See Volume 35 Page 279 Number 22436. All available evidence suggests that Henry Bolton Junior can only be Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, the father of William Bolton of Dublin. See, for example, my comments on Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346.
- (b) Note that the Deed is **dated** the same day as, and was **lodged** the same day as, the renewal of the lease of Ballyrea and Ballyshancarragh.
- (c) Cold Harbour, which is not listed as a townland in Griffith's Valuation of Ireland, is, in this dealing, given as a name for part of Ballinvalley, Barony of Ballagheen. In the 1728 Doyne dealing, (see Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825), reference is made to a grant of Wells , Finshoge, Part of Ballinvalley, and Coldharbour, to Henry Bolton. I have elsewhere speculated that the part of Ballinvalley which William Bolton, son of Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick took from his father "subject to a lease to Henry Bolton", may have been this part of Ballinvalley leased to Henry Bolton by Doyne before 1708. Is "Cold Harbour", described in the present dealing "Ballinvalley", the land leased to "Henry Bolton", to whose lease William Bolton of Ballinvalley's title was subject? See my comments on Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020, Volume 79 Page 70 Number 54617, and Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565.

- (d) In 1750 Henry Bolton of Ballyrea conveyed his interest in "Coldharbour, otherwise Ballinvalley" containing 44 acres 2 roods 30 perches to Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond. See Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565. In 1758 Henry Bolton of Ballyrea conveyed part of Cullentra to Henry Bolton of Cullentra. See Volume 213 Page 168 Number 140567. In 1770 Henry Bolton of Cullentra conveyed his interest in "Callierbu (sic), otherwise Ballinvalley", containing 45 acres, to William Stacey and another. On the basis of the various dealings, I consider that the property called Coldharbour was probably the 44 acres 2 roods 30 perches of Ballinvalley called "Coldharbour, otherwise Ballinvalley". I have been unable to discover any dealings with "Coldharbour" between the time it came into the hands of Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond and subsequently left the hands of Henry Bolton of Cullentra. Therefore, on the basis that no other title holder of "Coldharbour" has been traced between 1750 and 1770, it seems certain that Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond is one and the same person as Henry Bolton of Cullentra who, being a major subtenant of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, would undoubtedly be his son. - (e) It should be noted that Coolharbour, listed in Griffith's Valuations adjoins Ballyrea and other Bolton lands. Could Coldharbour be the eighteenth century name for the townland of Coolharbour? If that were the case, it would be more likely that the small parcel of part of Ballinvalley would be the land commonly called "Coldharbour".
- (f) further searches should be undertaken of the Deeds Index in order to find whether there were other dealings with these lands, particularly between 1708 and 1749.

- (1) The dealing is called "Articles of Agreement". The dealing states that George Johnson shall have the right, (subject to the profits from the tenements excepted as above) to occupy the lands "for and during the time that Samuel Rowsom might hold the same by virtue of the 'original lease'". As no details of the "original lease" are given we can only that the "original lease could be the lease granted to William Bolton of Ballinvalley in 1710. See Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346. William Rowsom, grandson of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the grantee under that 1710 lease, was a "life". Perhaps the Rowsom family acquired a part of Curraqhtubbin from their ancestor William Bolton of Ballinvalley, under this "original" lease, of which Samuel Rowsom's share was a third? It is suggested that this Samuel Rowsom may have been the "Samuel Rowsom, of Curra Table (sic), mentioned, by C.K.Bolton as being the grandson and Administrator of the estate of William Bolton of Ballinvalley who died intestate in 1762. A search by me of the Index of the Court of Exchequer in Dublin confirmed that a William Bolton of Ballinvalley died intestate, and had administration in his estate granted in 1762.
- (2) 80 acres of Curraghtubbin "commonly called Ash Clasheen" was conveyed by William Bolton of Ballinvalley to John Bolton of Ash Clasheen on the 11th December 1749, just two months after the subject dealing between Rowsom and Johnson. See Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720. A search should be undertaken to find the conveyance to Rowsom family interests by William Bolton of Ballinvalley. For Samuel Rowsom to be able to convey his interest in "one third" of Curraghtubbin to George Johnson there must surely be some intermediate conveyance in the Register of Deeds from William Bolton of Ballinvalley to Samuel Rowsom.

- (b) The lease to Richard Bolton is to him and his heirs, that is, a renewable lease. I have not found any renewal of the lease by Richard Bolton or his descendants.
- (c) The Mill lands are part of the lands in relation to which Henry Bolton later grants a rent charge, in favour of his eldest daughter Elizabeth, as part of her marriage portion, in 1758. See Volume 207 Page 70 Number 135605.

- (a) Ash Clasheen is not mentioned as a Townland in Griffith's Valuations. Curratubbin adjoins Clasheen. In a Doyne Deed, (see Page 47 Number 135029), the townland of 205 Lassinglassin, conveyed as part of the dealing between Doyne and William Bolton of Ballinvalley in relation to Curratubbin and Moneydane, (see Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346 is given an alias of Clasheen. I have speculated in Volume 31, mentioned above, that the sound of a spoken word may have dictated the way in which the word was written down. Thus Coldharbour can be spelt Calliebu, and similarly Lassinglassin can be rendered as Ash Clasheen. My conclusion is, therefore, that Clasheen is the townland of Lassinglassin which adjoins Curratubbin and which, presumably was considered as part of the farm of "Curratubbin" of which the Townland of Curratubbin was the principal holding in the lease from Doyne to William Bolton of Ballinvalley in 1710. The area given for Ash Clasheen is 80 plantation acres. Converted to English Statute acres, this gives an area of 129 acres. Clasheen, at the Griffith Valuation comprised 126 English Statute Acres. The conversion rate is calculated on the basis that 121 Irish Plantation Acres equal 196 English Statute Acres.
- (b) It will be noted that the life of William Bolton, son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea is the only life mentioned. When the lease was granted in 1710 it was for William Bolton's life, (that is, William Bolton son of Henry Bolton who was described as the eldest son of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the grantee of the lease), and for two other lives, namely, William Stacey and William Rowsome. It seems unusual that, if these latter two are dead, that there has been no substitution of further lives. The original lease was a lease to the grantee, his heirs and

assigns forever. See Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346.

- (c) William Bolton, the younger, of Ballinvalley, is a witness to the Deed. I would suggest that he is a son of William Bolton the grantor, and that the grantor is either one and the same as William Bolton, the grantee of Ballinvalley in the 1710 lease of Ballinvalley, or the son of that grantee. See Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346. On these alternatives, William Bolton, the younger, would be the brother of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, or his nephew. Richard Bolton of Ballyduff cannot, on the available material, be identified, although I would suggest that he, too, is most likely a brother of William Bolton the younger, the other witness to the Deed. I assume he is not a member of the Bolton family, late of Kilpatrick, and later of "Ballyduff", that is Lower and Upper Ballyduff.
- (d) The grantee, John Bolton, is, I suggest, either a son of the grantor, William Bolton of Ballinvalley, or his grandson. Note that the rent reduces after the death of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, as common practice when a grant was made to a younger son who, after his father's death, would otherwise have to pay full rent to his elder brother, the heir at law.

However we speculate on the intermediate descent, (and more might be revealed from Deeds not yet uncovered), it is clear, however, that we have identified the ancestor of the Bolton family of Clasheen as being the William Bolton of Ballinvalley, who was granted the 1710 lease of Curratubbin and who, as we, suggest, held Ballinvalley from Doyne before 1708. We assume, too, from the evidence in the various Deeds, that he is the son of Henry Bolton of Wells, Finshoge, Part of Ballinvalley, and Coldharbour. In other words, the common ancestor of the twentieth century families of Bolton Lee of Clasheen and Bolton of Queensland, formerly of Ballylusk, is this William Bolton, (that is the 1710 grantee), of Ballinvalley.

In my submission, the 20th Century families of Bolton-Lee of Clasheen, and Edwards of California descend from him through John Bolton of Ash Clasheen, the grantee in the subject Deed. The Bolton family of Queensland, and the Whelan Family of Ballinagran, descend from him through his eldest son, Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. See Volume 724 Page 514 Number 494849 for a more detailed outline of the Bolton of Queensland and Whelan of Ballinagran descent. The Greathead family of England descend from him through Julia Bolton, a daughter of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, a son or grandson of his. See Volume 296 Page 98 Number 194443 for a more detailed account of the descent of Julia Bolton. Thus, I suggest:

(e) In my research, I have not been able to establish whether John Bolton, who married Eleanor Earl by licence in 1818, was a member of the Bolton family set out above, and thus, whether the Valentine of Cornwall family is descended from him. Given that Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, his son, leased part of Cullentra to Thomas Earl and Robert and Alan Earl, his sons, (as to which see Volume 231 Page 398 Number 150527), in 1761, and that, at Griffith's Valuations almost 100 years later the Earl family held almost all of the townland of Cullentra, I would suggest that if the Valentine of Cornwall family establish descent from Thomas Earl, it would be most likely, based on the landholding of part of Cullentra that Thomas Earl married a daughter of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. If that were so, it would be highly likely that the Valentine of Cornwall family would be doubly descended from William Bolton of Ballinvalley. Because of the cost of procuring the licence from the Bishop, a marriage "by licence" was used only by well to do members of the Established Church during this period. Thus, I would suggest that John Bolton will prove to be from one of the Wexford Bolton families whose landholdings are traced in this research.

## COMMENTS

(a) This dealing, described as "Articles of Agreement", identifies "Cold Harbour", which is referred to in Burke and in C.K.Bolton's book. The Bolton Families of Ireland. "Cold Harbour" is not a Townland recognised in Griffith's Valuations, and, presumably, in an attempt to identify it, C.K.Bolton said,

at page 37 of his book, that "The Island, Cold Harbour, and Ballinastraw were names for the same estate". It is clear from this entry in the Deed Register that he was in error.

Ballyrea adjoins the townland of "Coolharbour", so called in Griffith's Valuations, as does Ballinvalley. Part of Ballinvalley was in the possession of William Bolton, son of Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick in 1734, having had it granted to him by Richard Bolton, Senior. Given that Ballinvalley, Ballyrea, Crane, and Kilpatrick adjoin "Cold Harbour otherwise Ballinvalley", I would suspect that Richard Bolton, senior, of Kilpatrick, and Henry Bolton senior, of Wells Finshoge and Ballinvalley, were brothers, or that Henry Bolton, Senior, was the father of Richard Bolton Senior of Kilpatrick. William Bolton, of the other Ballinvalley, would, thus, be either the nephew or brother of Richard Bolton, senior, of Kilpatrick. See my comments on the Deed dealing with Kilpatrick dated the 11th August 1702

The evidence that **all** the Wexford Bolton family being researched sprang from a common, (and, also, not distant), ancestor is, I submit, conclusive, given the close association of all of them with the key townland of Ballinvalley, part of which is held by Richard Bolton, senior, and part of which is held by Henry Bolton, senior. Note that they, and other Bolton namebearers related to Henry Bolton, senior, separately, occupy other townlands adjoining these key holdings. Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick holds the adjoining Crane and Kilpatrick, while Henry Bolton, senior, holds Wells Finshoge and Coldharbour. Henry Bolton, junior, holds Ballryea. Given other evidence that Richard Bolton, senior, has children, apparently around the age of the children of Henry Bolton, junior, of Ballyrea, I would submit that, on balance, Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, is the son of Henry Bolton, senior.

Thus, I submit that the reference in earlier Deeds to the fact that part of Ballinvalley was subject to a lease to Henry Bolton, refers not to Henry Bolton, the son of Richard Bolton, Senior, but to Henry Bolton of Wells, Finshoge, and Coldharbour, whose holding of Finshoge and Coldharbour are later in the possession of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. See my comments on Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020, Volume 79 Page 70 Number 54617, and on Volume 135 Page 132 Number 90719. Even later, Callierbu (sic) [I submit, Coldharbour], otherwise Ballinvalley, containing 45 acres, is in the possession of Henry Bolton of Cullentra who demises it to Stacey. I suggest elsewhere that Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond, the grantee of the subject lease of Coldharbour in 1750, is Henry Bolton of Cullentra, (1758). See Volume 135 Page 132 Number 90719, Volume 213 Page 168 Number 140567 and Volume 285 Page 542 Number 190163. Further research

should be done into the renewal of the lease of Ballinvalley before 1750.

(b) As the Deed, at its registration, updates the status of its witnesses, it seems that Elizabeth Bolton married William Percival sometime after 1750, and John Bolton of the Island had died between 1750 and 1761. The Ferns Wills Index lists probate of a Will of John Bolton of The Island in 1758.

One cannot say with any certainty, but it appears from reading the Deed, that William Bolton and John Hatton must have got together to ensure that John Hatton's purchase, (using William Bolton's name in 1750) was not blocked by other family members.

(a) Note that Ballinvalley is the Ballinvalley in the Barony of

Gorey, not Ballinvalley in the Barony of Ballagheen. dealing, therefore would seem to be a further dealing with the property leased to a William Bolton of Ballinvalley by Doyne, presumably before 1708, who was, I suggest, the same William Bolton who leased Curratubbin from Doyne in 1710, and who, we know, is the father of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, named as a life in the subject Deed. See Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346. As Henry Bolton of Ballyrea is a named life in the subject Deed, I suggest that he was a named life when the original grant was made, for, at the time of the subject Deed, Henry Bolton of Ballyrea would have been around 70 years of age. Clearly nobody would now be including him as a life! The subject Deed could be either between Doyne and the 1710 grantee of Curratubbin, (hardly likely, given that he would have to be over 90 years of age) or between Doyne and the son or grandson of that William Bolton of Ballinvalley. See my comments in Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720. In other words, I suggest that the Grantee is either the brother or, more likely, the nephew of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea.

I suspect that the new life being added by this dealing is Thomas Clifford, presumably a grandson of the grantee, or a grandson of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. It might be the case, too, that if the William Bolton named in the subject Deed is the nephew of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, and not his brother, that he, William Bolton, is being added as a life to replace his own deceased, or aged, father. Administration was, according to C.K. Bolton, granted in the intestate estate of a William Bolton of Ballinvalley to Samuel Rowsom of Curratubbin in 1762. See Volume 146 Page 114 Number 96897.

Further research should be undertaken to find the various dealings with Ballinvalley before 1758, particularly as the naming of lives in earlier dealings should conclusively resolve the relationships.

(b) The dealing seems to be a renewal of a lease, although it recites that Ballinvalley has been "demised farm let set to and released(?) to the grantee.

This Deed should be read in conjunction with the Deed in Volume 279 Page 527 Number 184134 and Volume 279 Page 537 Number 184137, by which Elizabeth Percival compounded with William Bolton for another arrangement
- (b) The "conveyance" of the Henry Bolton lands is for the purpose of **charging** the interest of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea and his successors in the <u>reversion</u>. That is, the tenants of Henry Bolton, in possession of Cullentra either under leases for a term of years, or in perpetuity, continue to enjoy their interests unaffected by this dealing. - (b) In 1775 William Bolton of the Island, grandson of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, joined in the Deed by his son William Bolton, entered into a bargain and sale for 5/- with Henry Bolton of Cullentra whereby the lives of the three sons of Henry Bolton of Cullentra were substituted for the lives of the senior family line named in the subject Deed. Presumably this saving cause has been inserted to ensure that the life nominated by Earl would be acceptable to the holder of the other part of the Cullentra lease, presumably Henry Bolton of Cullentra, or his heirs. See Volume 213 Page 168 Number 140567. It is presumed that Thomas Earl was the husband of a daughter of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, and that Robert and Alan Earl are grandchildren of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. Otherwise, I cannot see why Henry Bolton of Ballyrea would dispose of such an important holding. The Earl family were the occupiers of these lands at the 1832 tithes, and were in possession of almost the whole of the townland of Cullentra in 1852 at Griffith, Valuation of Ireland. (b) The Deed contains a notation on the back, dated the 4th October 1761, that, in consideration for the sum of £4/0/payable half yearly Henry Bolton and his heirs lets the "Cops" (sic) reserved to the Grantor in the Deed dated the 13th March 1760 to the Grantees. "Copps" is described in the Oxford Dictionary based on Historical Principles as an archaic form of the word "copse", that is, a wood.

Mary Bolton, I presume, is not the first wife of the Grantee, as she is described as "Mary the then wife...." One would assume, from such curious wording, that William Bolton's first wife was also named Mary. A submitted entry in the International Genealogical Index lists the marriage of a William Bolton and a Mary Linden at Dublin in 1759. Could these people be the lives, namely, "William and Mary Bolton", in the subject Deed?
- (b) I have already suggested that this "William Bolton of Ballinvalley" is the brother or nephew of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, and not William Bolton, the son of Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick. See, for example, my comment in relation to Volume 196 Page 9 Number 128888. Note that William Bolton of

Dublin, who, if I am correct, would have been the nephew or first cousin of the grantee, witnessed the dealing and attended to its registration in Dublin.

- (1) As the Rampart comprises "one field", I assume that the total area is 50 acres, not that they both contain 50 acres as the Deed would suggest. This dealing is one of several between William Bolton of Ballinvally and the Johnson family whereby he is acquiring a stake in the townland of Ballynestra.
- (2) This is the first mention of William Bolton of Clasheen I have come across. Certainly, with John Bolton of Ash Clasheen, and John Bolton of Clasheen mentioned in earlier Deeds involving

William Bolton of Ballinvalley, or Doyne, (as to which see Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720, and Volume 219 Page 77 Number 142713 respectively), it would seem that the Clasheen Bolton family are closely related to the Ballinvalley family. William Bolton was the attesting witness who registered the subject Deed at Dublin in 1775. I have suggested elsewhere that John Bolton of Ash Clasheen was a son of one of the William Bolton name bearers of Ballinvalley, and I suggest that the witness William Bolton in the subject Deed may have been the son of John Bolton. See Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720. This William Bolton of Clasheen may have been the "unknown" husband of Martha Bolton, the grandmother of Martha Bolton Lee. Suzie Kee (nee Lee, born 1903), a granddaughter of Martha Bolton Lee, told Byron Edwards that Martha Bolton of Clasheen, whose eldest son was William Bolton, was, according to her headstone in the parish Church at Monamolin, 90 years of age at her death in 1839.

Given that her son, William, was born in 1788, the following descent, as I speculated above in Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720, would be possible:

William Bolton of Ballinvalley (lease of Curratubbin 1710) was the ancestor of

John Bolton of (Ash) Clasheen whose son

William Bolton of Clasheen who married Martha (1749-1839) whose son

William Bolton of Clasheen (1788-1865) married, (1831), Ann Richards whose daughter

Martha Bolton 1838-1928) married (1863) Samuel Pearson Lee and was the ancestor of the Bolton-Lee family of Clasheen and the Byron Edwards family of California.

As Byron Edwards has noted, a William Bolton of Clasheen, and a John Bolton of Clasheen each farmed part of Clasheen at the time of Griffith's Valuations. The modern Clasheen, comprising both of the Griffith Valuation holdings, is farmed by William Bolton Lee, a descendant of William Bolton, (1788-1865), the lessee mentioned in Griffith's Valuations. Byron Edwards, who has traced all the descendants of William Bolton, (1788-1865), father of Martha Bolton Lee, has not accounted for the John Bolton of the Griffith Valuations. Presumably, in the eighteenth

or early nineteenth century, Clasheen was divided between two descendants of John Bolton, the grantee of Ash Clasheen in 1749. See Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720. A further search of the Deeds Index might uncover two such leases.

A further search should be made of the Deeds Index to find whether there are other dealings by Archer with the townlands of Ballyduff, Ballyduffbeg, Court and Ballyedmond, as Henry Bolton, the grantor in the subject Deed, undoubtedly derives his title ultimately from Henry Bolton, Senior, referred to in (a) above.

Certainly, when Julia Turvey (daughter of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, (as to which see Volume 572 Page 403 Number 90210), conveyed 37 acres 1 rood 12 perches of Ballinahorney to Beatty, she created a perpetual leasehold, something, presumably, only a freeholder would have the legal capacity to do.
- (b) In correspondence, (1995), with me, Dr Greathead, of England, a descendant of Julia Turvey, has referred to Lyndon Bolton, the eldest brother of Julia. On the basis of the reference in Burke's Landed Gentry of Ireland to the second marriage of William Bolton of Dublin and Island to "Miss Lyndon", and to the reference to their son Lyndon Bolton, whose line Burke traces, Dr Greathead suggested that Lyndon and Julia Bolton may have been descendants of William Bolton of Dublin and Island.

Julia Bolton married, as her second husband Benjamin Turvey, and they emigrated to South Africa. A Turvey family legend has it that "William Bolton was a wealthy squireen who, feeling his end was near, married off his 15 year old daughter to William Wright, a successful businessman in Dublin". Certainly the relative wealth of the parties, as demonstrated in Julia's Marriage Settlement, supports the financial aspect of the legend. William Bolton of Island, the person whom Burke purports to be the husband of Miss Lyndon died, however, in 1776, while Julia's father, "William Bolton", was alive in 1792 when he settled £400 on her. See further comments on Julia Bolton at Volume 444 Page 337 Number 288844.

Dr Greathead lists the siblings of Julia Bolton (herself the fifth daughter), as Abraham, Lindon, Lucinda, Mary, Lubina, and Phyllis. His source is The Reminiscences of the Turvey Family deposited in the Settlers Museum, Grahamstown, South Africa.

From the lives mentioned in the subject Deed it can be seen that Abraham and Phyllis are named lives as is Roger Lyndon Bolton. All of them are children of the grantee, William Bolton of Ballinvalley. Further, Abraham is the eldest, and Phyllis is the 4th daughter. A dealing by Julia Bolton with part of Ballinahorney, the land described in the subject Deed, clearly demonstrate her inheritance of that land from her father, the William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the grantee in the subject Deed. See Volume 572 Page 403 Number 390210.

A Lyndon Bolton, not Roger Lyndon Bolton, the named life in the subject Deed, is a witness to Julia's Marriage Settlement in 1792. See Volume 444 Page 337 number 288844. I would presume that Lyndon Bolton, the witness is, indeed, Roger Lyndon Bolton, the named life in the subject Deed, that is, Julia's brother, and not a stranger. I would submit that he could not possibly be "Lyndon Bolton, the son of William Bolton of Dublin and the Island", (as identified by Burke), by his second marriage, as the witness to a Marriage Settlement would be a close, and not quite remote, relative.

Given the many inaccuracies in Burke, I would go further, and suggest that Burke has wrongly attributed the marriage of William Bolton of Dublin and Island to "Miss Lyndon", whereas the correct attribution should be to William Bolton of Ballinvalley, and "of Dublin", as he is so described in Julia's Marriage Settlement. This would, in my submission, be a more probable explanation for what otherwise would be two William Bolton marriages, around the same time, to two women called Lyndon!! That is, on the balance of the evidence, I would submit that the line of Lyndon Bolton, traced by Burke, stems from William Bolton of Ballinvalley, and not from William Bolton of Dublin and Island.

(a) The dealing is expressed to be a bargain and sale for 5/-. As both William Bolton of Island and his son, William Bolton of Ballyrea, are the parties conveying the estate in the land to Henry Bolton of Cullentragh, for the lives of his descendants, it might be that Henry Bolton of Cullentragh has bought out the senior Bolton line in relation to this farm. However, Cullentra is listed as a William Bolton of the Island holding in a marriage settlement of 1811. See Volume 633 Page 439 Number 436052. What, then, is the practical significance of the substitution, in the subject Deed of lives nominated by Henry Bolton in lieu of William Bolton's own nominated lives? The joinder of the heir of William Bolton in the subject Deed possibly has to do with breaking an entail, or perhaps, with the creation, by Henry Bolton of Cullentra, of an entail.

(b) Fossey Tackaberry of Tomagaddy is a witness to the dealing. I suggest that Fossey Tackabery is the father of Mary Tackaberry who married Henry Bolton, the third son, mentioned as a life in the subject Deed, in 1793. See Ossory Ferns and Leighlin Marriage Bonds. On my overall hypothesis, Fossey Tackaberry, witness to the subject Deed, was a descendant of John Tackaberry of Tomagaddy, (Will 1752), and Hester Fossey, the daughter of Peter Fossey, (of Raheenmore 1721 - see Volume 31 Page 469 Number 19994), and was the grandfather of Fossey Bolton of Cullentra, that is:

(c) This is the last mention I have found of Ballyrea being used to describe a member of the Island Bolton family. Indeed, I have found no further reference to Ballyrea as a holding of the Island Bolton family or of any other Branch of the Bolton family. However, I have not found any dealing whereby they disposed of the Townland. Given that the family had held the Townland from at least 1710, and that the then Island Bolton family heir, William Bolton, the younger, was, as at the date of the subject Deed, of Ballyrea, surely there are other dealings to be uncovered. The Townland is not enumerated as a holding in any later Marriage Settlement of the Island family. No Bolton family name bearer is a lessor or lessee of any part of Ballyrea at Griffith's Valuations.

his father, William Johnson, deceased, confirms the arrangements made. William Bolton of Ballinvalley had been building up a holding in Ballynestra for many years. The William Bolton of Prospect the party to the subject Deed is the same William Bolton of Ballinvalley who, by Deed dated 6th December 1766, (as the subject Deed recites), purchased Samuel Edwards' interest in Ballinastra from Mary Johnson. However his relationship to Mary Hatton, the wife of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea is unclear. According to The Irish Genealogist, Volume 5, Henry Hatton, (fl.1780), was an Attorney of the Court of Exchequer. C.K.Bolton, in Bolton Families in Ireland, at page 34 states that Anthony Bolton, (claimed by him to be the progenitor of the various Wexford Bolton families which we are interested in), married a daughter of Jerome Markham of Kilkevan, some time before 1667. In view of the many errors I have discovered in C.K.Bolton's book, I place little reliance on it. However, in the light of the mention of the townland of Kilkevan, in no way

a part of the <u>Island</u> operation, it may be that this townland <u>found</u> its way into the Bolton family holdings via a marriage with a daughter of the proprietor of that townland. Further research into the townland of Kilkevan might be rewarding. From the recital of the townlands it seems clear that the properties are all freehold. Whether William Bolton of the Island owned other leasehold property is unclear. Certainly he would have succeeded to all property forming part of his inheritance in 1780, his father, William Bolton, of Dublin, having died in 1776.

The Deed further recites that Henry Bolton the younger is to hold the lease otherwise in accordance with the covenants between Henry Bolton the elder and William Bolton late of Island, the head lessee. See Volume 305 Page 537 Number 203516. The rent of £31/18/3 is expressed as being the "head landlord's rent", that is, the rent payable to the Island family.
- (2) The Deed also conveys to Henry Bolton, the younger, the entire stock of Horses owned by Henry Bolton the elder, 12 cows, and farming utensils, with the further right to cut spread dry and carry away 56 inches of turf from that part of Cullentra in the possession of James D'arcy. 101 acres of Cullentra had been leased by Henry Bolton of Ballyrea to D'arcy for a term of 31 years in 1758. In the event of Benjamin Wright's death or changed circumstances the trustees were to pay the £400/-/- to Julia Bolton. Benjamin Wright died in or before 1805. Julia then married Edward Turvey, by licence, in 1805. From her dealings with Ballinahorney, (see Volume 572 Page 403 Number 390210), it is assumed that she had an inheritance, consisting of part of Ballinahorney, over and above this marriage settlement from her father.

- (2) William Bolton of Ballinvalley, father of Julia Bolton, is here described as "of Dublin". In 1772 he was described in a Deed as "of Ballinvalley", (see Volume 296 Page 98 Number 194443), and, in 1776 he was described, in a Deed, as "of Prospect. See Volume 363 Page 323 Number 532572. Abraham Bolton, a trustee of the Marriage Settlement, is clearly Julia's brother, being named in a Deed as being William Bolton's eldest son. See Volume 296 Page 98 Number 194443. Lyndon Bolton is, I assume, William Bolton's second son, named in Volume 296 Page 98 Number 194443 as Roger Lyndon Bolton, and not the Lyndon Bolton said by Burke to be the son of William Bolton of Dublin and Island by his second wife "Miss Lyndon".

The recitals state that Richard Bolton had already made provision for his son, the said Edward Bolton, in a Deed dated the 10th April 1791 in which he conferred, on trustees, the subject 105 acres, at a rent of £10 per annum. The total acres held in Ballyduff by Richard Bolton is stated to be 231 acres, forever, at a rent of £44/10. The trustees of the 1791 grant were Edward Earl and John Feris, parties to the subject Deed. The subject dealing creates an annuity of £15 to be paid to Ann after the death of Edward Bolton, and, subject to her interest, after the death of Edward Bolton, the land is to be held by the trustees for Edward Bolton's heirs male.
- (2) Who is John Bolton of Ballynestra? From other dealings involving a "John Bolton of Ballinestra", he may be a descendant of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, whom we saw, was building up a holding in Ballinestra. See, for example, Volume 363 Page 323 Number 532572. He would, on the basis of the subject Deed, be more likely to be a brother of the grantee, Edward Bolton, that is, another son of Richard Bolton of Ballyduff. Around the time of the subject Deed, both an Edward Bolton and a John Bolton were buying leases in Ballinestra. In 1808 John Bolton sold his holding in Ballynestra to Edward Bolton. I think a simple error has occurred. Note, too, that, in a Deed of June 1795, (Volume 490 Page 400 Number 315427), Edward Bolton of Ballynestra names as lives, two children, Ann and Richard, who, as he was married in 1793, would have been the oldest. C.K.Bolton, in Bolton Families of Ireland lists the children of Edward Bolton and Ann Richards as follows:

The Deed recites that Richard Seely had granted a lease to Henry Bolton of Ballyrea on the 19th September 1730 and that the estates of Richard Seely and Henry Bolton respectively were now vested in William Edwards and William Bolton respectively. By lease dated the 28th August 1787 William Edwards had renewed the lease to William Bolton substituting the life of Denny Bolton the third son of William Bolton for William Stephens deceased. Since the renewal, Mary Morris, formerly Bolton, a named life in the former lease had died, and, in the 1808 lease it was intended to substitute the life of John Burke, the son of Richard Burke of Moneyboe for Mary Morris. The Deed further recites that "the dwelling house of the said William Bolton, together with the said Deed dated the 19th September 1730 and several annexures thereto had been destroyed in the rebellion which broke out in Ireland in the year 1798". See Volume 63 Page 484 Number 44518 for the original lease. As noted in the Comments to Volume 63, the lease was one in perpetuity. The rent of £100/10/-, and the fine on the falling in of a life, £50/5/-, accordingly, remained the same in the renewed lease of 1808. The lease of 1787 should be found in the Deeds Index and researched in order to establish whether any other family relationships can be established.

- (2) William Stephens must have been substituted after 1730 and before 1787 for a life named in the 1737 lease. Perhaps he was a grandson of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea? Note that, in the lease by Doyne to William Bolton of Dublin of the townlands of Ballyadam and Ballybran in 1757, Samuel Stephens eldest son, and Edward Stephens third son, of Edward Stephens, late of Ballyadam, are mentioned as "lives". See Volume 183 Page 536 Number 123785.
- (3) As John Burke, the son of Richard Burke of Moneyboe, is substituted as a "life" in the subject Deed, I assume that he is a grandson of William Bolton. William Bolton had a rentcharge over Moneyboe from Doyne in 1772. Moneyboe adjoins Island and Ballyhigh, William Bolton of Island's central landholding, and was, it would seem, part of that Estate before 1708; it is so described in a Doyne dealing in 1727. See Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825.
- (4) Mary Morris, formerly Bolton, is, it is assumed, Mary Bolton, the youngest daughter of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, named as a life in the 1730 lease. The 1730 lease was for the lives of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, William Bolton his son, and his youngest daughter. Mary Bolton is described as his "youngest daughter" in another dealing by Henry Bolton of Ballyrea with Cullentra. See Volume 213 Page 168 Number 140567. I submit it is

she who is "Mary Morris formerly Bolton". Henry Bolton of Ballyrea and William Bolton his son, (grandfather and father respectively of William Bolton of Island, the life in the 1808 lease), are not recited in the 1787 lease. Other renewals would therefore have occurred between 1730 and 1787, and should be traced.

COMMENTS The Deed recites that Shapland Swinney had granted a lease to Henry Bolton of Ballyrea on the 11th November 1737 and that the estates of Shapland Swinney and Henry Bolton respectively were now vested in Richard Goff and William Bolton respectively. By lease dated the 18th May 1790 Richard Goff had renewed the lease to William Bolton substituting the lives of Henry Bolton and Philip Bolton for the lives of Elizabeth Percival and Henry Denny Bolton.

Since the renewal, Henry Bolton one of the replacement names in the lease of 18th May 1790 had died, and, in the 1808 lease it was intended to substitute the life of John Burke, the son of Richard Burke of Moneyboe for Henry Bolton. Presumably John Burke is William Bolton's grandson. See my comments on Volume 603 Page 262 Number 412029.

The Deed further recites that "the dwelling house of the said William Bolton, together with the said Deed dated the 11th November 1737 and several annexures thereto had been destroyed in the rebellion which broke out in Ireland in the year 1798". See Volume 88 Page 335 Number 62788 for the original lease. As noted in the Comments there, the lease was one in perpetuity. The rent and the fine of one peppercorn payable on the falling in of a life, accordingly, remained the same in the renewed lease of 1808.

The named lives in the 1737 lease were Elizabeth Bolton, (afterwards Percival) who is named as a former life in the 1790 lease, and John and Philip Bolton, sons of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. As John and Philip Bolton, sons of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea are not recited in the 1790 lease, other renewals would therefore have occurred between 1737 and 1790, and should be traced. The lease of 1790 should be found in the Deeds Index, and researched, in order to establish whether any other relationships can be established.

# COMMENTS

- (a) In the recitals to the Deed it states that there was a release, (by will?), of the settlement dated the 16th October 1780. Had Dorothea Bolton [Blunden] died before 1811?
- (b) In the recitals to the Marriage Settlement, William Bolton, the elder, acknowledges receipt of the sum of £5000/0/- paid to him by Joshua Nunn and, in consideration, charges his estate in favour of William Bolton the younger, subject to the interest in his estate of £3000/0/- for his younger children, and "subject to the rights of possession and lease renewal of the named family and blood of the said William Bolton the elder". The epitome of the Marriage Settlement does not set out the details of the leases etc of "the named family and blood". It will be noted that Cullentra is in the list of properties the subject of this Marriage Settlement. No doubt the rights of the "named family and blood of the said William Bolton the elder" included the Henry Bolton and the Thomas Earl families, both of Cullentra.

Query, is it possible to search the Deed itself, which is, as I understand it, is lodged in the Registry of Deeds, rather than having to rely on the Clerk's epitome??

- (c) As is to be expected from other research, Clasheen, being, on my hypothesis, a holding of the William Bolton of Ballinvalley line, is not mentioned in this, or in any other of the Marriage Settlements of the subject line, descended from Henry Bolton of Ballyrea.
- (d) The Marriage Settlement refers to the Chapel land, otherwise the townland of Tullowen. In the 1840 Edition of Burke, the

Doyne family is referred to as of Wells and "Tullow Cottage", County Carlow.

(e) The Marriage Settlement mentions that the total of the freehold lands held by William Bolton coming into the Marriage Settlement is  $\underline{2010}$  Acres. The 1876 Report to the English Parliament of the Landowners of Ireland lists only one William Bolton as a landholder in the County of Wexford, and states that his holding is 2010 acres.

  26/- for the life of Henry Bolton. The Deed makes no mention of
  binding Henry Bolton's heirs. The usual conveyancing jargon is
  also missing, namely "give, let farm let, lease. etc etc...".
  Is this an absolute conveyance, with perhaps a fictitious
  consideration, "two fields to be given up in a years time for
  the life of Henry Bolton..." designed, perhaps, to defeat stamp
  duty on an absolute conveyance without consideration, or is it
  some other exotic conveyancing "sleight of hand"?? It is, I
  suggest, a family dealing between father, (Henry Bolton), and
  son, (Edward Bolton), witnessed by a younger son, (Fossey
  Bolton).
- (2) Henry Bolton, the grantor in the subject Deed, obtained 53 acres of Cullentra from his father, Henry Bolton, in 1789. Clearly the subject Deed is a father to son conveyance of that land, there being no dealing by Henry Bolton with Cullentra recorded in the Deeds Register between 1789 and 1818. the witness, Fossey Bolton of Cullentra is, undoubtedly, another son. In 1861, a Fossey Bolton, born in 1797, and described in the Census as "born in Monamolin, Ireland", was residing on the Isle of Man. One of his daughters, residing with him on census night, was described as being born at "Ballylusk, Ireland". From these, and other records, it is clear that the witness to the

subject Deed, Fossey Bolton of Cullentra, is one and the same as Fossey Bolton of the Isle of Man, and of Ballylusk.

(3) The 1861 Census of the Isle of Man lists a Henry Bolton, of Monamolin, Ireland, born in 1795, and his wife, Caroline. An Ossory Ferns and Leighlin Marriage Licence of 1828 records the marriage of Henry Bolton and Caroline Beale. I would suggest that this Henry Bolton may prove to be an elder brother of Fossey Bolton, of the Isle of Man, late of Ballylusk. Certainly "Henry Bolton" namebearers farmed at Cullentra after the date of the subject Deed. The 1832 Tithes Records disclose that Henry Bolton, senior, farmed 12 acres of Cullentra, and Henry Bolton, junior, farmed 48 acres of Cullentra.



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# Bolton Family Genealogy - a commentary

The genealogy of the Bolton Family of Wexford, said to have descended from Richard Bolton of Ballyduff, is set out in C.K.Bolton's, Bolton Families in Ireland. Burke, Landed Gentry of Ireland, traces a similar line of descent from Richard Bolton of Ballyduff and Cold Harbour. Part of the line of descent, printed in Bolton Families in Ireland, is set out below, together with my comments. The comments, in bold italics, are based, principally, on my analysis of the Deeds researched by me from the Register of Deeds, as set out in Appendix A.

# NOTES:

- (a) The numbering of persons as mentioned in C.K.Bolton's book has been preserved for easy reference).
- (b) \*\* against a name means that I have not researched the person. It does not, on the basis of my review of the accuracy of Charles Knowles Bolton's references, mean that I accept either that the person existed, or that the person was a member of the family attributed to the person by Charles Knowles Bolton.

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6. RICHARD BOLTON was born about 1670, the first generation mentioned in Burke.

When Anthony died, in 1702, this Richard (unless he was a different Richard) released lands in Kilpatrick, Crane, and Ballinvalley, and was called a yeoman. Burke calls him of Ballyduff. He married, about 1694, Grace.

Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, Crane, Ballinvalley, Ballyduff, and Upper and Lower Kilmihill, (hereinafter called Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick), could have been born around 1670, and could have married Grace around 1694. She is mentioned in many Deeds as his wife. See, for example, Irish Deed Register Volume 60 Page 405 Number 41663.

He purchased the equivalent of freehold of Kilpatrick Crane and Ballinvalley by a Deed of RELEASE on the 11th August 1702. See Irish Deed Register Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020. He purchased the equivalent of freehold of "Ballyduff" on the 17th October 1705. See Irish Deed Register Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942.

He did not, as Charles Knowles Bolton suggests, "re-lease" property, that is, in the sense of leasing it again, after someone's death. A "release" was a technical legal term whereby, effectively, the freehold of land was acquired. See my comments on Irish Deed Register Volume 30 Page 430 Number 19044.

I have found no reference to an "Anthony Bolton" in any research. I therefore question the "pedigree of generations" made out by Charles Knowles Bolton, given the naming patterns of the period which, on my research, seem to be "obeyed" by the Bolton families.

From my searches into the Irish Deed Register, I believe that "Cold Harbour" was part of Ballinvalley. See my comments in Volume 135 Page 132 Number 90719, Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565, and Volume 285 Page 542 Number 190163.

#### CHILDREN

6a. RICHARD BOLTON was born about 1685. He was of Ballyduff and Cold Harbour, County Wexford, married Anne, daughter of Sir J. Roberts of Ardamine. He died in January 1730, a "colonus" or farmer. His will was dated the 8th and proved the 14th January 1730.

I can find no evidence to support this entry. Richard Bolton of father of Richard Bolton, Kilpatrick was the "Ballyduff", which I consider to have been part of the townlands of Upper and Lower Ballyduff, Barony of Ballagheen.

Both Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and Richard Bolton of Ballyduff were alive on the 26th October 1731 when Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick conveyed the freehold of Ballyduff to Richard Bolton of Ballyduff. See Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942. Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick was alive on the 25th October 1732. See Irish Deed Register Volume 70 Page 462 Number 49051. Richard Bolton, of Ballyduff, when entering into a Deed on the 25th January 1743/44, describes Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick as "my late father". See Irish Deed Register Volume 150 Page 237 Number 101497.

#### CHILDREN:

(i) ANNE 1713. born about Kilnemanagh, Co Wexford, Spinster, Marriage Licence Issued 17th November 1731 to marry George Annesley of St. Bridget's. Dublin.

George Annesley, sometimes described as "of Dublin", sometimes as "of Kilpatrick" was a witness to many Deeds involving Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick. See, for example, Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020. I would suggest, therefore, that he was the son-in-law of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, and that this "Anne" was the daughter of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick.

8. (ii) RICHARD BOLTON was born about 1715. According to Burke he had two sons. His home, Ballyduff House, the old Bolton manor house, was burnt in the rebellion of 1798.

Richard Bolton of Ballyduff, the son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick must have been born at least ten years before 1715. He leased Ballyduff from his father as early as 1727. See Irish Deed Register Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942. I suggest that he was born around 1700.

Edward Bolton, and not Richard, was the eldest son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick. I suggest that Richard Bolton of Ballyduff was the second son. I assume that Edward and Richard alone had reached the age of majority in 1725 when they joined in creating a mortgage(?) over Ballyduff. See Irish Deed Register Volume 53 Page 221 Number 35167.

#### CHILDREN:

16. (i) EDWARD BOLTON was born about 1750. Of Ballinastraw and married Anne Richards at Glynn, County Wexford 5th February 1793. During the rebellion of 1798 she was brought up to Dublin in a market cart disguised as a peasant woman, bringing her children. He died young.

Edward Bolton married Anne Richards in 1793. See their marriage settlement in Volume 475 Page 206 Number 303442. I suspect, given the time span between these two generations, that there ought to be another generation between Richard Bolton, junior, son of Richard Bolton senior of Kilpatrick and Edward Bolton presumably another Richard Bolton. Edward Bolton was granted 105 acres of Ballyduff by the marriage settlement. He accumulated 135 (plantation) acres of Ballynestra, (that is, Ballinastraw), between 1794 and 1808.

Elizabeth Bolton, the wife of William Perceval, was the daughter of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, the ancestor of the William Bolton of the Island line. His existence, and his parentage, not only of this Elizabeth, but also of William Bolton of Dublin and later of the Island, John Bolton of the Island, (probably) Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond, Cullentra, and Cold Harbour (Calliebu) otherwise Ballinvalley, and other children, is too well documented in the Irish Deed Register for there to be any doubt that both Burke and C. K. Bolton are in error.

omission of this key ancestor displays grossly flawed scholarship on the part of those authors. For the descent of this family from Henry Bolton of Ballyrea as their immediate ancestor, see Irish Deed Register Volume 633 Page 439 Number 436052.

For the description of Elizabeth Bolton as the wife of Perceval, see Irish Deed Register Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565.

> 9. (iv) JOHN BOLTON was born about 1718. He lived at The Island, County Wexford, and had a considerable fortune. He died without issue, and by will dated 10th August, 1758, proved 10th November, left his fortune to his brother William. The Island, Harbour, and Ballinastraw were names for the same estate.

John Bolton was a son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, and a younger brother of William Bolton of Dublin, later of the Island.

John Bolton leased the Island from Doyne in 1746/47. See Volume 140 Page 196 Number 93876. After his death, his brother William Bolton, leased the Island from Doyne in 1759. See Volume 201 Page 146 Number 132173.

Charles Knowles Bolton states that the Island, Cold Harbour, and Ballinastraw, were different names for the same estate". This is patently not so!!! See my comments on the Irish Deed Register, Volume 135 Page 132 Number 90719, and Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565.

> 10. (v) 10. WILLIAM BOLTON was born about 1730. He was a commissioner for taking affidavits in Wexford. He married, first, Grace, second daughter of Denny Cuffe of Sandhill, County Carlow. Не married, second, Miss Lyndon. He was of Dublin when he died in 1776 intestate (admin. April). Henry and John were administrators.

William Bolton of Dublin and later the Island, was the eldest son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. He was alive on the 14th September 1710, (see Irish Deed Register Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346), but was probably not born much before 8th February 1709/10. See Irish Deed Register Volume 28 Page 220 Number 17347. He is described as "the father of William Bolton the elder", who is, himself, described as the grandson of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea in the marriage settlement of William Bolton, called "the younger", in 1811. See Irish Deed Register Volume 633 Page 439 Number 436052.

William Bolton of Dublin married Grace Cuffe as appears from a Deed in the Irish Deed Register Volume 201 Number 335 Page 133055.

Henry Denny Bolton and John Bolton were administrators of the intestate estate of their father, William Bolton of Dublin and Island. See Volume 320 Page 594 Number 220324.

18. (i) WILLIAM BOLTON was born about 1745. He lived at Island, County Wexford and was High Sheriff in 1789. He married (license 11th Oct. 1780) Dorothea, daughter of Sir John Blunden, Bart., of Castle Blunden, County Kilkenny.

From various Deeds the outline is correct. See, for example, Irish Deed Register, Volume 201 Page 146 Number 132173, and Volume 336 Page 524 Number 226203.

He married Maria Chowners in 1819 as is attested by a marriage settlement. See Volume 741 Page 533 Number 505068.

B.A. 1775; He married (license 20th August 1776) Anna Maria, daughter of Jonah Wheeler of Lyrath, County Kilkenny. He was a physician and died In 1790.

Henry Denny Bolton is mentioned as a "life" in a Deed entered into by William Bolton, his father. See Irish Deed Register Volume 201 Page 146 Number 132173. He was the husband of Anne Maria, as to which see Irish Deeds Register Number 289114.

> 21. (iv) LYNDON BOLTON, born about 1760.

Based on my research into the descent from William Bolton of Ballinvalley, a contemporary of William Bolton of the Island, it is my submission that "Miss Lyndon" was Mary Lyndon, the wife of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, and not the second wife of William Bolton of the Island. If this were so, Lyndon Bolton is Roger Lyndon Bolton, "youngest son" of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, (so described in 1772), and the brother of Julia Bolton. See, in particular, my comments at Volume 296 Page 98 Number 194443.

11. (vi) BENJAMIN BOLTON, born about 1721.

A Benjamin Bolton of Ballyduff was a witness to a Deed of William Bolton of Ballinvalley the son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick in 1734. See Irish Deed Register Volume 80 Page 174 Number 55400. Is this the same Benjamin Bolton?? If so, could it be inferred that he is the son of Richard Bolton of Ballyduff, another son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick?

> 12. (vii) ABRAHAM BOLTON was born about 1723. He lived at Ballinvalley, County Wexford, and married Anne Eyres. His will was probated in 1753.

An Abraham Bolton witnessed a Deed of Henry Bolton, senior, of Ballyduffbeg, in 1720, and a Deed of Richard Bolton (senior) of Kilpatrick, in 1721. See Irish Deed Register Volume 35 Page 279 Number 22436 and Volume 32 Page 71 Number 18982 respectively. I have not found the subject Abraham Bolton in research to date.

\*\* 22. HENRY BOLTON, born about 1746. He lived at Monamolin, County Wexford, and went to New York in 1772. He married Mary, daughter of Adam Sutton, of Bog and Warren, County Wexford. One daughter, Isabella, married to Joaquin Carrion, of Madrid, Councillor of State to the King of Spain.

(viii) HUGH BOLTON, born about 1725. Perhaps of Crandaniel.

(sic) (ix) HENRY BOLTON born about 1727. Married and had issue. Of Ballyduff.

A Henry Bolton of Ballyedmond and Cullentra could have been born around 1727. He is, based on the amount of key Bolton lands passed on to him by Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, probably the son of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. See Irish Deed Register Volume 213 Page 168 Number 140567 and Volume 213 Page 166 Number 140565.

If my speculation as to the identity of Elizabeth Goodwin is correct, if he were born around 1727 he may have been the son of Elizabeth Goodwin and not the son of Mary Hatton. See Irish Deed Register Volume 47 Page 98 Number 29642. On the basis of naming patterns, and on the amount of land he acquired from Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, I suggest, however, that he was one of the older sons of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, probably the third son, and, therefore, was born much earlier than 1727. That is, I suggest that he was a son of Mary Hatton. He is, on the basis of my research, the ancestor of Fossey Bolton of Ballylusk. See Volume 724 Page 514 Number 494849 for my analysis.

#### (x) MARY

Mary Bolton is described in a Deed as the youngest daughter of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. See Irish Deed Register Volume 213 Page 168 Number 140567. She married a member of the Morris family. See my comments to Volume 603 Page 262 Number 412029.

\*\* (xi) DIANA

6b. (?) (ii). WILLIAM BOLTON, born about 1694. Of Ballinvalley, County Wexford, Gentleman when he died in 1762 (admin. 5th February), his grandson, Samuel Rowsom of Curragh Table, County Wexford, farmer, being administrator.

In 1734 he leased to Moore and Jones the lands of Kilpatrick Crane and Ballinvalley which his father, Richard, had previously leased in 1702 upon the death of his grandfather Anthony. This is the pedigree of three generations made out in 1887 by Rev. W. Ball Wright and copied in 1934 by Edward Richards Bolton of London.

There are, at least, three William Bolton name bearers described Ballinvalley". One being "of is William Bolton Ballinvalley (called WB1), who, in purchasing a lease of Curratubbin, in 1710, (see Irish Deed Register Volume 31 Page 24 Number 17346), takes it for three lives: the life of William Bolton, the eldest son of Henry Bolton, himself the eldest son of William Bolton of Ballinvalley; the life of William Stacey, the son of the eldest daughter of William Bolton of Ballinvalley; the life of William Rowsome, the son of the second daughter of William Bolton of Ballinvalley. I calculate that this William Bolton was born around 1665. I suggest that he had a son, William Bolton, (called WB2), described in a Deed which he witnessed, as "the younger". See Irish Deed Register Volume 140 Page 169 Number 93720.

The third William Bolton of Ballinvalley was William Bolton of another Ballinvalley, (called WB3), the son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick. See Irish Deed Register Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020. It was this William Bolton who leased, to Moore and Jones, the lands given to him by his father Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick. See Irish Deed Register Volume 79 Page 70 Number 54617.

Note that Charles Knowles Bolton again refers to the "re-lease" townlands by Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, and "grandfather Anthony", and see my comments above in relation to Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick.

Charles Knowles Bolton describes Samuel Rowsom as being of "Curra Table". There is no townland in Wexford of that name. I suggest that Samuel Rowsom was of Curratubbin, not Curra Table!! If this is so, then, clearly, Rowsom is a descendant of the eldest daughter of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, the father of, I suggest, Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. Samuel Rowsom is, therefore, the grantee of probate of the will of either WB1, his grandfather or great-grandfather, or of WB2, his uncle, or great-uncle. As for the "pedigree of three generations copied out in 1877", in the light of the plain inaccuracies in the handing down of much of the records I have been reviewing, I would rather rely on contemporary evidence in the Irish Deed Register than on the jottings of Rev W. Ball Wright some 140 years later.

Samuel Rowsom was the lessee of one third of Curratubbin by 1749. See Volume 146 Page 114 Number 96897.

6c. (iii) EDWARD BOLTON, born at Kilpatrick, County Wexford, in 1696 Entered Dublin University in 1714/15, aged 19, having prepared at Mr Sheridan's in Dublin. He was the son of Richard a Colonus.

Edward Bolton was the eldest son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, and is so described in a number of Deeds. See, for example Irish Deed Register Volume 38 Page 42 Number 23716, where, as heir apparent, he joined with his father in a Deed which defeated the estate tail, (?), in Lower Kilpatrick. I have found no references to him after 1734. Perhaps he died without issue?

7. (sic) (iv) HENRY BOLTON of Ballyduff Will 1752.

I have found only two reference to a Henry Bolton of Ballyduff. The first, in 1727, describes a Henry Bolton as being of Ballyduff and Ballyedmond. The lease to him covers Ballyduff and Ballycourtedmond, (sic), containing 323 acres. See Irish Deed Register Volume 64 Page 66 Number 42636. The second reference, in 1761 is to Henry Bolton of Ballyduff who is granted part of Ballyduffbeg and part of "Court and Ballyedmond". The total area of this latter grant is a mere 59 acres. See Volume 292 Page 264 Number 190381. I suggest that the "Ballyduff" mentioned in this is the small townland lying next to Ballyrea, dealing Ballyedmond, and Ballycourtedmond.

In another Deed of 1725 Henry Bolton of Ballyrea (HB2), is described as Henry Bolton,  $\underline{Junior}$ , while Henry Bolton of Ballyduffbeg and Ballyedmond,  $\overline{(HB1)}$ , is described as "Senior". As Henry Bolton of Ballyrea was the son of William Bolton of Ballinvalley, (WB1), I have suggested that Henry Bolton of Ballyduffbeg, (and many other townlands), was the grandfather of Henry Bolton of Ballyrea. Clearly the subject "Henry Bolton" of Ballyduff, (HB3), cannot be "Henry Bolton, Senior", (HB1), although, based on the thread of occupation of the Ballyduff/ Ballyduffbeg/ Ballyedmond lands, a chain of inheritance must exist. If HB1 were the 1727 grantee of Ballyduff, it may have been his Will that was probated in 1730. It may be that the Will

of HB3 was probated in 1752, in which case, the grant of a lesser amount of Ballyduff /Ballyduffbeg /Ballyedmond lands may have been made to yet another Henry Bolton of Ballyduff, (HB4), presumably a son of HB3. Other Deeds, as yet to be uncovered, may disclose the distribution of the balance of the 323 acres leased in the 1727 lease.

The Henry Bolton of Ballyduff described by Charles Knowles Bolton as dying in 1752 cannot be Henry Bolton of Ballyrea, (HB2), as he was alive as late as the 4th October 1761. See Irish Deed Register Volume 231 Page 389 Number 50527. On the other hand, more unlikely explanations might be that the reference is to a son of Richard Bolton of Ballyduff, (Richard Bolton, junior, formerly of Kilpatrick), or it might be to yet another namebearer, Henry Bolton of Carrigg, the son of Richard Bolton, Senior of Kilpatrick, or to his descendant.

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This additional information adds to the information given in Adrian Cardell's "Appendix A" which consists of the Bolton Deeds found in the Registry of Deeds of County Wexford, Ireland.

- Excerpts from the will of Edward Bolton in 1812 (he died in 1813 at the age of 40) where he states that Ballyduff LOWER was given to him by his late father, Richard Bolton of Ballyduff. He was a brother one generation Richard Bolton. They were sons of Richard Bolton who made his will 7 May 1791.
- Griffiths Valuation listings for Ballyduff (1848-1864), A copy of the Griffiths Valuation and a transcribed copy with explanation, of these forms and the two cousins named Richard Bolton who occupied the two areas which were then known as Bally UPPER –the main homestead; and Ballyduff LOWER (Primrose Cottage). (See "Focus on the "original" Richard Bolton" in this document for the identity of these two cousins).

For example, the first film number listed is that of 461318 (for the deed of Henry Bolton and his wife Mary Hatton; this Henry Bolton is the son of the "original" Willaim Bolton).

Type this film number into the "Film Number Source" of the FHL Catalog. It will bring up the entire collection of 2686 icrofilms.

So it looks like Richard Bolton Snr died between 1730 and 1737 and Edward who was the eldest son was still alive as was Richard Bolton Jr, his next oldest son; John Davis of Enniscorthy is a party of the deed because he had a mortgage on the property and needed to be paid back.

# SOME BACKGROUND INFORMATION, for your review:

There were three men surnamed BOLTON, who appear to me to be probable brothers who purchased large tracts of land in County Wexford, Ireland, about 1700-1705. They were: Richard Bolton [Sr]; William Bolton, and Henry Bolton.

Perhaps these were all sons of a soldier from England who came at the time of Oliver Cromwell in the 1640s. Strong family tradition in the descendants of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick state that their first BOLTON ancestor in Ireland came from England as a soldier at the time of Oliver Cromwell- and there is one Richard Bolton among the solders of that time. (There are also other soldiers of the time of Oliver Cromwell who could be possibilities.) It is said that our Bolton ancestor "fell in love with an Irish maiden and remained in Ireland."

# FURTHER EXPLANATION:

From Adrian Cardell, introduction in "Notes on the Genealogy of the Bolton Family of Ballylusk Wexford [Ireland]":

"Richard Bolton senior, of Kilpatrick, held the equivalent of the freehold of Crane, Kilpatrick and Ballinvalley, and of Ballyduff.

Henry Bolton of Wells held the lease of Wells, Finshogue, part of Ballinvalley, (that is, part of the Ballinvalley, the freehold of which had been purchased by Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick, it seems), and Coldharbour. He also seems to have had an interest in Court or Courtballyedmond and another Ballyduff\*.

William Bolton of a different Ballinvalley held the leasehold of that "Ballinvalley", and Curratubbin, while his son Henry Bolton of Ballyrea held the leasehold of Ballyrea."

\*Note from Elizabeth L Nichols--- There are two areas named Ballyduff in County Wexford referenced in these deeds, which often causes confusion in understanding the deeds. The property owned by our Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick which he left to his son Richard Bolton Jr is the one described thus:

PROPERTY: Ballyduff in the BARONY of Ballagheen.

Ballyduff was later divided into Ballyduff Upper and Ballyduff Lower. My ancestor, Richard Bolton, left Ballyduff to the eldest son in each generation (it was entailed); but one generation divided it into Ballyduff Upper and Ballyduff Lower--and my ancestors owned Ballyduff Upper, which the emigrant Richard Bolton (1796-1876) "returned to Ireland for the sale of" in 1860. Before leaving Ireland he had leased this land to a brotherwhen Richard and his wife Frances and their children had moved to Adalaide, Ontario, Canada in 1840. That 1860 sale in found recorded in the Landed Estate Papers of County Wexford, Ireland and refers to the original purchase of Ballyduff in 1705 by an earlier generation Richard Bolton, of Kilpatrick (who had purchased Kilpatrick in 1702).

In deeds or deed memorials of about 1730-32, Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick identified four sons-- Edward Bolton, his eldest son (whose age when he entered the university indicates a birth year of about 1696), Richard Bolton Jr (my ancestor) to whom he left Ballyduff; Henry Bolton, and William Bolton. See more details on this family later in this book under Generation 5 in "Focus on the "original" Richard Bolton", and in "Appendix A" by Adrian Cardell.

William Bolton (the "original" William Bolton) who purchased or leased land in about 1702 as described above is the ancestor of "William Bolton of the Island" and there was has been good qualify research done on this segment of the Bolton family. The "original" William Bolton had a son Henry Bolton who married Mary Hatton. (Careful not to confuse him with either the first generation Henry Bolton or with the Henry Bolton who was the son of Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick.) This Henry and Mary (Hatton) Bolton are ancestors of William Bolton of "the Island." Thus, they belong to the "original" William Bolton.

I am not aware of any detailed research done into identifying the descendants of the "original" Henry Bolton.

# The following deed is a marriage settlement deed (not included in Appendix A):

The Nov 1795 marriage settlement for Richard Bolton and Elizabeth Allen, who were married 3 Dec 1795 as recorded in the St Iberius parish-Church of Ireland, but the deed of marriage settlement was not recorded until 1802:

# Marriage settlement in Registry of Deeds no 313 05 207334

Dated 28 Nov 1795 between Richard Bolton Gentleman of Ballyduff, co Wexford in first part; Robert Allen Gentleman, Latimerstown. In second part Elizabeth Allen, spinster, daughter of Robert Allen in third part and John Allen Gentleman of Johnstown, Co Wexford

in the fourth part, reciting that Richard Bolton party to the said deed by virtue of and under the last will of his father Richard Bolton, Gentleman whose will dated 7 May1791 was? an estate for his life with? for his first and every other first entail male in all that parts of the Townes and lands of Ballyduff comprising 150 acres thereabouts in the possession of Richard Bolton

(barely legible from here on) but you've got the most important information! Recorded in 1802. [transcribed for Elizabeth Nichols, courtesy of Claire Sullivan of Dublin, Ireland]

# FROM THE WILL OF EDWARD BOLTON MADE IN 1812 (son of Richard Bolton who made his will 7 May 1791, and brother of Richard Bolton who married Elizabeth Allen in Dec 1795)

--a copy of the will of Edward Bolton 1813 ref T 17421 (card indexes). It contained nine (9) A3 size pages. His wife was Anna Richards. His father from whom he inherited the farm was Richard Bolton of Ballyduff. [research done by hired researcher in Dublin, Ireland in Aug 2012.]

---Edward Bolton in his will, written 1812; probated Aug 1813, identified his 5 sons as Richard-eldest, Henry - 2nd son, Edward - 3rd son, John-4th son, and William - 5th son; and his daughters as Jemima as eldest daughter, Frances as 2nd daughter, and Anna as his 3rd daughter -- and referred to the child his wife was then carrying--and there was an Elizabeth born in May 1813-- this is the child her mother was carrying when the father made the will in 1812 [will probated in Oct 1813] [Elizabeth L Nichols has photocopy of original will, from Dublin - hired researcher, Aug 2012] Edward referred to when each son reached the age of 21 years, and each daughter married with her mother's approval and the approval of his trustees. His burial [found in the parish register of St Iberius Church of Ireland, County Wexford] record identified him as age 40 when he died in 1813. This would make him born about 1773.

This Edward Bolton referred to land he owned Ballyduff, which he inherited from his late father, Richard Bolton.

Edward left 110 acres of land in Ballyduff to his eldest son Richard Bolton [b 23 Jan 1795, Ballinstraw, County Wexford]... stating that he [Edward] received it in settlement from his late father, Richard Bolton of Ballyduff. [He also referred to land in Balliastraw - upper and lower, etc, that he leased, etc.] He identified his wife as Anna Bolton, or Richards. His will was proved in Diocese of Ferns and Leighlin, and proved Oct 1813 session of court.

The will of Ann Bolton, widow of Edward Bolton, made in 1737 also exists and has been studied. It refers to a bond she holds from her husband's late father, Richard Bolton and his son also Richard Bolton now living at Ballyduff. This confirms the relationships.

The marriage of Edward Bolton in 1793, Diocese of Ossory, Province of Leinster, Ireland (which included County Wexford at that time) is also online.

The book *Bolton Families in Ireland* by Charles Knowles Bolton, lists exact marriage date and lists it as in County Wexford, Ireland: 5 Feb 1793.

C. K. Bolton also lists exact birth dates for each of the 13 children of Edward Bolton and Anne or Anna Richards Bolton, and the death dates for several who died as children. While there are many errors and wrong assumptions in his work, the information for persons born

after 1800 is generally better quality than the earlier generations. The first child in this family was born in November 1793.

See also deeds in Adrian Cardell's "Appendix A" for the marriage settlement in Feb 1793, of Edward Bolton and Anne Richards, daughter of Henry Richards; also Mr. Cardell's comments on that deed.

The following deed tells us that Edward Bolton had children Anne and Richard by June 1795. [from Adrian Cardell document "Appendix A"] FHL film number 535728; Volume 490 page 400 number 315427 Deed date 1795 25th June; recorded 1795 25th June Grantor Mary Doyne, widow, of Dublin; GRANTEE Edward Bolton of Ballynestra, farmer LIVES: the said Edward Bolton, his daughter Ann Bolton, and his son Richard Bolton. (See "Appendix A" for the entire deed.)

In 1840 Richard Bolton of Ballyduff leased Ballyduff Upper to his brother (it does not state the relationship, but that is who it is), made just before Richard and Frances Bolton migrated to Adelaide, Ontario, Canada. This lease is referenced in the sale document on Ballyduff Upper in 1860—(see a copy of that entire document included later in this document).

NOW—GRIFFITHS VALUATION OF LAND (Ballyduff UPPER owned by Richard Bolton born 20 Oct 1796; and Ballyduff LOWER, owned by Richard Bolton born 23 Jan 1795—the two men were first cousins.)

I have used this to explain more of the meaning of the Griffiths Valuation documents, for the benefit of a non-Irish researcher.... (my background is in US research, and some of the Irish sources are new to US readers).

#### Griffiths Valuations list both

**Ballyduff UPPER** (with the main house)—which is owned by my ancestor, Richard Bolton (Oct 1796-1876), son of Richard Bolton (abt 1770-1834, who married Elizabeth Allen in Dec 1795). This Richard Bolton is actually now living in Adelaide, Ontario, Canada and has been for twenty years. But he still owns land in County Wexford, Ireland so is listed in the land records there.

**Ballyduff LOWER (Primrose Cottage),** which is owned by his cousin, Richard Bolton (b 23 Jan 1795) who is son of Edward Bolton (1773-1812); Edward married Anne or Anna Richards in 1793.

Note that the description of its location: Ballyduff was located in the civil parish of Ardamine in the county of Wexford). Remember that civil and ecclesiastical (church) areas, though they may have the same names, did not necessarily include the same boundaries.





Note that John A Bolton apparently is sub-leasing some of the property that he is leasing from his brother Richard Bolton. These are both sons of Richard Bolton and Elizabeth Allen who were married in Dec 1795.

Their father, another generation Richard Bolton, had a brother Edward Bolton –and they were sons of yet another generation named Richard Bolton. Remember that both Edward Bolton and his brother Richard Bolton had sons named Richard Bolton. The Richard Bolton who owned Ballyduff UPPER is son of Richard Bolton and Elizabeth Allen and was born /baptized in St Iberius parish 20 Oct 1796.

Richard Bolton, son of Edward Bolton and Ann Richards, was born 23 Jan 1795 in Ballyinstraw; he owned Ballyduff LOWER.

NOW, Please note the following refers to Richard Bolton b 1795 son of Edward):

Page 118 has 4 lines on the Ballyduff UPPER entry; and above it we find Ballyduff LOWER -- with the "other" Richard Bolton (son of Edward) -- with lessor just Richard Bolton; occupiers - James Whelan, Edward Whelan, Patrick Whelan, James Ruth, John Bryan, and Church-- for a total of 173-1-33; 88-15-0[11-15-0; and total annual value of rateable property of 100-10-0; with exemption of the church and yard then subtracted out.]

It is interesting that following the end of the Ballyduff Upper on page 119, we have in Ballylusk Townland: William Bolton and Fossey Bolton as Immediate Lessors; with Fossey Bolton and Vacant for occupiers;--other neighbors include Robert Doyne; Solomon A Richards, Edward Richards [probably brother to Elizabeth Richards, 2nd wife of Richard Bolton, son of Edward Bolton, etc. (See the Addendum in this book for more information on these families.)

NOW the 1860 sale of Ballyduff UPPER owned by the Richard Bolton who married Elizabeth Allen (see actual photocopies of the document following the transcription):

1860 May 1 Land sale in County Wexford, Ireland

Landed Estate Court, sold by auction, the lands of Ballyduff Upper, on the instructions of Richard Bolton, owner and petitioner. It consisted of 231 acres being the whole of Ballyduff upper.

(Remember that Ireland acres were different from acres in other countries. One Irish (or plantation) acre was equivalent to 1.62 statute (English) acres. The statute acre contains 4,840 square yards compared with the Irish measure of 7,840 square yards. (This explanation taken from : Andrews, *Plantation acres*, pp. 4-18; Bourke, 'Notes on some agricultural', pp. 236-245.)

"The townland of Ballyduff is listed in Griffiths Valuation in 1853 as Ballyduff Upper consisting of 223 acres and Ballyduff Lower of 173 acres, all owned (or leased) by Richard Bolton. So the total of Ballyduff land is 400 acres." [correspondence from Claire Sullivan]

"The sale notice mentions that part of the land was leased to John A Bolton on 10<sup>th</sup> June 1840 for the term of 21 years or the life of the owner, now aged 63 years. [Our Richard Bolton was aged 63 years in May of 1860.]

As stated, this supports and fits the family tradition that my emigrant ancestor, Richard Bolton, returned to County Wexford, Ireland to sell land "several years after he moved to Ontario, Canada."

The lease document also states that the land was obtained by "fee farm grant" in 1705, by a Richard Bolton (this means it was an outright sale but the seller wanted a rent from it.) It means it was not inherited in 1705.

Note that Ballyduff was divided at some point into Ballyduff Upper, and the house on it was known as "Ballyduff House"; while the other part, known Ballyduff Lower, included the house known as "Primrose Cottage". Ballyduff Lower was owned by Richard Bolton, s son of Edward, and born/baptized 23 Jan 1795—the record refers to 105 acres "now vested in Edward John Bolton" who was son of this Richard Bolton, of Gorey, County, Wexford, Ireland—son of Edward Bolton 1773-1813—see his will made in 1812.)

Please note that this 1 May 1860 sale by a Richard Bolton who was then age 63 says it was previously leased on 10 June 1840—which would appear to indicate that it was done at the time that our emigrant Richard Bolton (born/baptized 20 Oct 1796 and md to Frances White) left Ireland for Adalaide, Ontario, Canada.

Apparently Ballyduff left the Bolton family with this 1860 sale.

MORE ON THE SALE DOCUMENT (quotes from the document):

Under "observations" in this form:

Quantity, per Ordinance Survey, statue measure: 227a, or, 27p Griffiths valuation 139 "These lands will be sold subject to the right of the public to the use of roads leading through same to Gorey, Courtown Harbor, Ballycanew, Monamolin, Kilena, and Blackwater"

Barony of Ballaghkeen, and County of Wexford, containing by estimation 231 acres, more or less, bounded as therein, at the yearly rent of 33, late currency, equivalent to the sum of 30/9/2 3/4, present currency, for the life of said William Parsons, and from and after the death of said William Parsons 2/9/ and acres, in lieu of which the yearly rent of 30, late currency, equivalent to the sun of 27/13/10, present currency, payable half-yearly, on every Christmas Day, and Lady Day in each year, has hitherto been received.

By Deed, bearing date of 22 Oct 1774, made between Edward Noy, of the one part, and Richard Bolton, of the other part, the said Edward Noy, granted and demised to said Richard Bolton, his heirs and assigns, forever, all that and those, the said Town and Lands of Ballyduff, containing by estimation 231 acres, more or less, at the yearly rent of 14/10, payable half-yearly, on every 25th of March and 29th day of September, above all taxes and outgoings whatever.

Though the rent reserved by said grant of 22<sup>nd</sup> Oct 1774, is but 14/10, making together the rent of 44/10; no apportionment of this rent has ever been made. [This could be because it was always mortgaged.]

105 acres of said Lands, comprised in said grants of 17 September 1705, and 22 Oct 1774, are now vested in Edward John Bolton\*, Esquire, who pays as his proportion of said rent of 44/10, the sum of 13/3/7, late currency, equivalent to the 12/3/4 ½ present currency, to the representatives of said William Parsons, and the sum of 6/7/6 present currency to the representatives of said Edward Noy, making together the sum of 18/0/11, and the owner pays for the proportion of the lands to be sold in this matter, to the head landlord, the sum of 16/16/6, late currency, equivalent to the sum of 15/10/8 present currency, and to the representatives of said Edward Noy, the sum of 8/2/7/ late currency equivalent to the sum of 7/10/1 present currency, making together the yearly sum of 23/0/10.

The Lands for sale in this matter will therefore be sold subject to the entries of said rents of 30, and 14/10 late currency, but with such right of contribution from the portion of said premises in said grants not for sale in this matter, as is just and reasonable, and which has heretofore been estimated as mentioned above.

The owner has not the original of any of the foregoing deeds, but copies thereof are lodged in Court, and will be handed to the purchaser, all of them, save the deed of 17 Sept 1705, have been registered, and attested copies of the memorials will also be handed to the purchaser.

Remember that the home of this branch of Richard Bolton families was burned during the "1798 Rebellion." That is probably why he did not have any original documents.]



The first record of Richard Bolton the emigrant to Adelaide, Ontario, Canada is the 1851 Census. The value of this census is it tells us the names, ages, and place of birth of each child.

The census tells us that William H. Bolton was the first of the family born in Canada about 1841, therefore the family left Ireland about 1840. This corresponds with the date of the lease for the land in Ballyduff, Wexford, Ireland.

# Focus on the "original" Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and Ballyduff in County Wexford, Ireland

by Elizabeth L. Nichols

This shows the pedigree links for ancestors of Elizabeth Nichols, beginning with the Richard Bolton who sold Ballyduff in 1860; who is also the emigrant Richard Bolton, born/baptized in St Iberius parish, County Wexford, Ireland on 20 Oct 1796; married there on 19April 1826 to Frances White; migrated with his family to Adelaide, Ontario, Canada in 1840, where he died in 1876; taking each generation **back** to the "original" Richard Bolton of County Wexford, Ireland – the sale document of Ballyduff identified the purchaser of Ballyduff in 1705 as Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick; with sources for each generation.

Where Elizabeth Nichols fits in the BOLTON family of County Wexford, Ireland:

I can trace my pedigree back to the "original" Richard Bolton and his wife Grace, who were known to have purchased land in County Wexford, Ireland by 1702; and who purchased Ballyduff townland in 1705. There is much detail that I do not yet have, but I can prove each basic link.

Let's begin with the one closest to me, and work backward:

Generation 1 – closest to me—let's begin with the first Richard Bolton, who was the emigrant from Ireland to Canada in 1840:

This Richard Bolton, was born/baptized 20 Oct 1796, recorded in the St Iberius parish of the Church of Ireland (Anglican) parish register, son of Richard and Elizabeth Bolton (RCB P0874.1.2 page 72, entry 11)].

He married there 19 April 1826 to Frances White, daughter of John and Mary White (also found in the same parish register- "Richard Bolton of Ballyduff and Frances White of Wexford, spinster".). Their marriage is also recorded in the Marriage Licenses of Ossory diocese (which includes the area of County Wexford at that time).

They are also found in Canada census records for 1851, 1861, 1871. Here is more details on the Canada sources for this couple:

[other family members are also buried there.] We have pictures of the tombstones of the wife Frances Bolton; and the two single children: Richard Bolton and Fanny Bolton.

EARLY LIFE: Baptism and marraige records of Ireland... St Iberius parish, Church of Ireland in County Wexford....

ALSO Methodist church records in Ireland -- Newtownbarry circuit, County Wexford, Ireland class roll--in 1836 has Richard and Frances Bolton bracketed together indicating husband and wife, so we know they were assoicated with the Methodist church there. (Methodist church did not perform ordinances such as baptisms and these were usually recorded in the Church of Ireland at that time.)

LAND RECORDS IN IRELAND --found in 2013, that show the lease in 1840 and the sale in 1860 of the land which our family tradition said our Richard Bolton went back to Ireland to sell "several years after he emigreed to Canada"

The sale document has also been found. See that in the previous section of this book. His land is also found in the Griffiths Valuation land records. See details in previous section of this book.

We now have his baptism/christening (Wayne and Denise Nichols, my nephew and his wife, confirmed it in 2012 in Ireland) and many additional records on this man and his family.

From our "family records, we have this:

Leander (Lea) William Bolton, son of William Henry Bolton and Elizabeth Harvey Bolton) wrote of Richard and Frances White Bolton "migrated to Ontario from Ireland and bought 300 acres of land in Middlesex County near Strathroy. They had four daughters and three sons. Bessie, Isabella, Fanny, and Anna Marie; Bessie married David Jury a fine old fellow they had no children but they reared a neighbor boy and gave him a good education and he went to Spokane Washington where he build a goood business his name was John Rinehart Isabella married Rev. John Shaw. I sent you his picutre... do not know how many children they raised. Aunt Bessy had pictures of some; one Fred was a professional tenor singer who was singing for one of the big churces in NY City he made some records record the Edison Company

Richard William oldest of the sons died at Strathroy

Anna Maria married Edwin Wright, they raised five children; two daughters-- Ada who married Alexander Forbes; Lottie who married William Hall they had 2 boys the last I heard. John J Bolton youngest of these sons went to California; they had two sons and Maybe others. I heard that these boys studied and made this a career; Aunt Fanny died not married." Above details written to Elizabeth by Uncle Lea [Leander William Bolton, in probably about 1960]

Uncle Lea also stated that the maiden suranme of Richard Bolton's mother was Miss ALLEN. And that family tradition stated that the first Bolton ancestor in Ireland came from England as a soldier at the time of Oliver Cromwell and "fell in love with an Irish maiden and remained in Ireland.".

### Known children of Richard and Frances (White) Bolton are (as detailed above):

1] Richard William Bolton, born 28 Jan 1827; baptized 19 Feb 1827, St Iberius, Wexford, Ireland

(Church Records. Parish register in St Iberius, Wexford, Ireland, Anglican or Church of Ireland, searched in May 2012 by Wayne and Denise Nichols, in Dublin [2 listings, only one gives the sponsors]

Richard-William Bolton b 28 Jan 1827, son of Richard and Frances Bolton-sponsors-baptized "Feb 19, 1827, Richard-William, son of Richard Bolton, of Ballyduff and Frances, his wife, born 28 Jan 1827. Also in another transcription of the record sent to Elizabeth Nichols later.)

Died –unknown but by 1836 or 3/7 – Ireland [no record is found on this child beyond the baptism; but another child was given the same name a few years later; and this child did not accompany the family from Ireland to Canada in 1840).

- 2] Elizabeth Frances (Bessie) Bolton, born 1 Oct 1828, baptized 16 Oct 1828, St Iberius, Wexford, Ireland [md David Jury]; died 27 Sept 1916, Ontario, Canada [baptism in parish register of St Iberius; and listed in Canada census records, as cited above).
- 3] Isabella Bolton, born 23 July 1830; bapt 1 Aug 1830 St Iberius, Wexford, Ireland; [md 28 May 1857 Ontario, Canada to Rev. John Shaw]; (baptism in St Iberius church parish register; and she is found in Canada census records, as cited above).

- 4] Richard William Bolton, born abt 1837, Ireland [never md] died 29 Oct 1909 Strathroy, Ontario, Canada; bur 4<sup>th</sup> line Old Methodist Cem, Adelaide, Middlesex, Ontario, Canada [his birth nor his baptism records have been found; but he is in Canada census records as born in Ireland; and is buried near his parents in the Old Methodist Cemetery there.]
- 5] Frances (Fannie) Bolton, baptized 30 Dec 1838, Ardamine, Wexford, Ireland; [never md] died 9 Dec 1915, Ontario, Canada; bur 4<sup>th</sup> Line Old Methodist Cem, Adelaide, Middlesex, Ontario, Canada (birth from parish register of the Anglican Church in Ardamine, County Wexford, Ireland; and she is found in the Canada census records as cited above; and we have a photo of her tombstone, buried near her parents.)
- 6] William Henry Bolton, born 10 March 1841, Oxford County, Ontario, Canada; md 27 Dec 1865, Houghton twp. Norfolk, Ontario, Canada to Elizabeth H Harvie /Harvey; died 18 July 1930, Scranton, Green County, Iowa USA; they had 3 children when they migrated by covered wagon to homestead in Iowa USA about 1876. (I have several pictures of them and their children.)

This is my great-grandfather. As noted, he was the sixth known child of his emigrant parents, and the first one born after they arrived in Ontario, Canada. (His eldest son John Albert Ernest Bolton, known mostly as Ernest of A. E. Bolton was my grandfather.)

"Grandfather wore a beard. He was of medium height" referring to William Henry Bolton-who went by William Bolton.

[this is from Besse Bolton Nichols, third child of his oldest son, Besse grew up in Iowa and spent quite a bit of time with both sets of grandparents. Besse said she often went with her grandfather Bolton into the fields and woods. He was always patient with her and would answer her questions, and she loved that.]

Also death certificates, cemetery records, obituaries, and other sources on these children.

7] Anna Maria Bolton, born abt 1843, Ontario, Canada, md abt 1865 to Edwin Wright; died 8 July 1913, Ontario, Canada (Census records of Ontario, Canada, as cited above; and personal knowledge of her brother William Henry Bolton and his second son, Leander William Bolton.)

8] John J. Bolton, born 7 May 1845, Ontario, Canada; md 30 June 1869, Ontario, Canada to Mary Ann Swayze; died before 1920 in California USA (Census records in Ontario, Canada and USA – California; and family records:

His nephew, Leander William Bolton said John J Bolton went to California and had 2 sons -- perhaps more--who studied medicine.

See also census records as a child in Ontario; and in 1871 he is married and still living in Ontario; have not found him in 1880; but in 1900 he is in California and from the birth places of his children appears to have been there since about 1873; also there in 1910; his wife is a widow in 1920 USA California census...

# DETAILS:

1900 California-1900 living in El Monte, Los Angeles, California, Census John J Bolton born May 1845, age 55 md 31 yrs b Canada-English Mary A wife -Mary A, wife of John J Bolton was born Mar 1850 in Canada --md 31 years, and mother of 6 children with 5 living.
5 children listed; they later also adopted a child.

Thus, you can tell by the birth places of the children of Richard and Frances (White) BOLTON when the family left Ireland and the parents began to have children born in Ontario, Canada – they moved about 1840. They are known to have affiliated with the Methodist Church in Ireland, Newtownbarry circuit, County Wexford, Ireland. In a class roll in 1836 it has Richard and Frances Bolton bracketed together indicating husband and wife. (A Richard Bolton was listed on these Methodist class rolls as early as 1819; and may have been the father of this Richard Bolton.)

Richard Bolton who was born 20 Oct 1796 died 2 Aug 1876, age 79 years, in Ontario, Canada; and is buried in the 4<sup>th</sup> Line Old Methodist Cem, Adelaide, Middlesex, Ontario, Canada. He and his wife and family are found in the Ontario, Canada census records 1851, 1861, 1871; and in the cemetery records and their deaths are in the vital records of Ontario.

Generation 2- Richard Bolton, father of the above: the name of his wife is not yet known. His birth record has not been found; his birth is estimated as "about 1770" from a variety of facts. He was married 3 Dec 1795 in St Iberius to Elizabeth Allen, daughter of Robert Allen and granddaughter of John Allen; he was the son of yet another generation Richard Bolton. His marriage is found in the parish register of the St Iberius church; and the marriage settlement is listed in the previous document called "Supplement to Appendix A", ref Registry of Deeds no 313 05 207334. He died 10 March 1834, at Ballyduff [death notice in the Freemans Journal in March 1834 "occurred on 10th inst. Richard Bolton snr of Ballyduffe"; also verified by the fact that his sister-in-law's will of 1837 states that her husband's late father, Richard Bolton ...indicating that Richard Bolton was deceased by 1837.]

Known children of this Richard Bolton and his wife Elizabeth Allen Bolton:

1] Richard Bolton, born 20 Oct 1796, St Iberius, County Wexford, Ireland [see above]

2] Robert Allen Bolton, baptized 17 Oct 1797, St Iberius, County Wexford, Ireland

St Iberius Church parish register, Church of Ireland or Anglican Church, County Wexford, Ireland; Union: Wexford/Kilscoran; Baptism: RCB Lib ref P0874.1.2 page 76, entry 8:

His death has not been found. (His brothers John Allen Bolton and Ebenezer Nunn Bolton, M.D. both died in 1874.)

3] John Allen Bolton, born abt 1799, of County Wexford, Ireland; md 21 Dec 1822 at Ballycanew, Wexford, Ireland to Catherine Floyd; died 9 Aug 1874, Ballyduff, Wexford, Ireland; bur Harrison, Dublin, Ireland

MARRIAGE: BOLTON, John Allen of Ardamine Parish and Catherine Floyd of Ballycanew parish, md 21.12.1822 by License.

In parish of Ballycanew & Kiltrisk Marriages in parish register entries from Claire Sullivan, July 2014. [wife's name previous read as Lloyd in son's death record in Australia] Baptism of his (John Allen Bolton's) wife also found in said parish register. (the original parish register was destroyed in the rebellion of 1798--where his baptism record was perhaps recorded; his birth or baptism records have not been found.]

NOTE: John Allen Bolton had a son named for his brother: Ebenezer Nunn Bolton, this son was born abt 1834 in Ireland and migrated to Australia where he died in 1910.

DEATH: BOLTON- on Sunday, Aug 9th, universally and deservedly regretted, John Allen Bolton, Esq., of Ballyduff House, Baltinacrea and Camolin, County Wexford, aged 75 years. His end was peace. The funeral will leave for Monamolin at 11 o'clock tomorrow (Wednesday)" 11 Aug 1874 - Irish Times newspaper (online)

4] Ebenezer Nunn Bolton, [MD- medical doctor]; baptized 2 Jan 1803, St Iberius, Wexford, Ireland (St Iberius parish register: "Ebenezer Nunn, son of Rich'd & Elizabeth BOLTON" he became a medical doctor and is listed on many records including as father of some of his children as Ebenezer Nunn Bolton, M.D.; md 1836 in County Wexford, Ireland to Hannah Sophia Wright; bur 24 Feb 1874, St Paul, Dublin, Ireland

Generation 2 Richard Bolton died 10 March 1834, Ballyduff, Wexford, Ireland

His home was burned in the 1798 "Rebellion" (see "claimants who were reimbursed.) Many of his family records were obviously destroyed at that time.

Generation 3 – Richard Bolton, father of the above; the name of his wife is not yet known; we have given him an estimated birth year of abt 1725.

He had two known sons:

1] Richard Bolton, born abt 1770, of Ballyduff, Wexford, Ireland, md 3 Dec 1795 Elizabeth Allen (see above) died 10 March 1834

His marriage settlement of Nov 1795 referred to his father's will of 7 May 1791 (where it was stated that Ballyduff was entailed to the eldest son). His marriage settlement is detailed in the previous section of this book; his marriage is also found in the parish register of St Iberius Anglican church.

This Richard Bolton died in 1834, as cited above.

2] Edward Bolton, (age 40 in 1813 when he died – [Burials in the St Iberius Church of Ireland, ref RCB Library P0873.1.3 page 13, entry 13, years 1813 August 1], so born abt 1773, born at Ballyduff, County Wexford, Ireland; an attorney; md 5 Feb 1793 [marriage settlement and marriage license] to Anna Richards in County Wexford; made his will in 1812; bur 1 Aug 1813; we also have his will, where he described his land which was to go each of his sons, then all minors –including his part of Ballyduff (Ballyduff Lower, which he said he inherited from his late Father, Richard Bolton]; we also have the will of his widow made in 1837—and she refers to Richard Bolton, the late father of her late husband Edward Bolton – confirming the relationship of the two men, and that Richard Bolton was deceased by that date (she held his bond for something, cosigned by him and his son the present Richard Bolton of Ballyduff).

Two grandsons of this Richard Bolton (who were cousins) are the two Richard Bolton men who owned Ballyduff UPPER and Ballyduff LOWER in Griffiths' Land Valuations, etc.: They were:

Richard Bolton, son of Richard and Elizabeth (Allen) Bolton, b. 20 Oct 1796, St Iberius, County Wexford, Ireland; md there 19 Apr 1826 to Frances White; migrated to Adelaide, Ontario, Canada in 1840 (see Generation 1)

His cousin, Richard Bolton, son of Edward and Anna (Richards) Bolton, b 23 Jan 1795, at Ballinstraw, County Wexford, Ireland, md twice: 1<sup>st</sup> 27 Aug 1818 to Susanna Richards, daughter of John Richards and Mary Morris (Sources: Genealogical Chart prepared by George Pickering Richards in 1858 in Ireland and Richards information received from Christopher Richards of London, England); and md 2<sup>nd</sup> 28 Jan 1828 in Tacumshane, County Wexford, to Elizabeth Richards, daughter of Christopher Richards and Anne Berry. (Newspaper article "The Wexford Herald, Sat Feb 2<sup>nd</sup> 1828, p 3 and extractions of church parish registers of Anglican church in County Wexford, Ireland—Tacumshane, Kilscoran named wife as daughter of the late Christopher Richard of Gorey.) There were 4 children by the first marriage and one child by the second marriage (found in parish registers). From the first marriage, the eldest son was Edward John Bolton born 30 June 1819 in Ballycanew, County Wexford, Ireland. He, like his grandfather Edward Bolton, was an attorney, and he represented his father's cousin in the sale of the Ballyduff property in 1860.

This Generation 3 Richard Bolton died about 1791 [will made 7 May 1791], Ballyduff, Wexford, Ireland (as cited in the marriage settlement of his son Richard Bolton in Nov 1795).

# Generation 4 Richard Bolton - (backward from the emigrant Richard Bolton)

We know that our Richard Bolton was of Ballyduff, and assume this generation to be the Richard Bolton Jr of Kilpatrick, who his father identified in several deeds or deed memorials, including one in 1731, and who inherited Ballyduff from his father, Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick and Ballyduff.

Little else has been proven about him. (Though secondary sources give information concerning him. He is the first generation mentioned in Burke's *Landed Gentry of Ireland*, but that source has a lot of incorrect information concerning him.)

Some say that his wife was Anne ROBERTS and this is probably true; certainly deeds indicate that one Hugh Roberts was involved as participate or witness in many deeds

regarding this Richard Bolton family. (Wills show there were two generations of Hugh Roberts.) However, the name of the wife of Richard Bolton Jr of Kilpatrick and Ballyduff has never been **proven.** 

From the land records, we know that he had a son named Richard Bolton (the one who made his will 7 May 1791).

We assume that "Generation 4" Richard Bolton was born about 1698, based on the fact that Edward Bolton was his elder brother and university records indicate that Edward was age 19 in Feb 1714/15—making Edward born about 1696.

We are seeking clarification on the printed information we can find on Richard Bolton Jr of Ballyduff; or correct information. We know that some of the information from Burke's Landed Gentry of Ireland is not correct on these early Richard Bolton families.

Richard Bolton Jr is found in many deeds, but none that clarify the name of his wife; at least not yet found by us.

His death date has not yet been found.

Generation 5 Richard Bolton (backward from the emigrant to Adelaide, Ontario, Canada, Richard) ---

Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick was married to Grace; and first purchased land in County Welford by 1702 when he purchased Kilpatrick; and purchased Ballyduff in Sept 1705.

This deed re-construction is taken from "Appendix A" of the document by Adrian Cardell:

(The dealing was before the establishment of the Register in 1708).

- (a) This dealing has been reconstructed from the information contained in the recitals to the dealing in Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020
- (b) A Doyne Deed that mentions Richard Bolton as a tenant describes his holding as being Kilpatrick, Crane and part of Ballinvalley. See Volume 55 Page 255 Number 36825. The same Deed refers to Henry Bolton as being in possession of Welles, Finshoge, part of Ballinvalley, and Cold Harbour. Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick grants Ballinvalley to his son, Richard, in 1730, subject to a lease to Henry Bolton of part of the premises. See Volume 69 Page 25 Number 47020. I consider that the Henry Bolton referred to in Volume 69 is the Henry Bolton referred to in the Doyne dealing in Volume 55, (or his heir), and is not the Henry Bolton, (another son of Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick), referred to in Volume 70 Page 462 Number 49051. If this assumption is correct, {as to which see (c) below}, one might draw the conclusion, from the location of the various properties described, that Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and Henry Bolton of Wells each inherited part of Ballinvalley from a common ancestor, who presumable, once held all the properties named in Volume 55 from Doyne before 1708. Ballinvalley lies between

their respective holdings described in the Doyne transaction in Volume 55. Alternatively, based on my assumption as to their respective ages, (taking into account the probable age of their presumed descendants alive in the 1720's), Henry Bolton of Wells may be the father of Richard Bolton, Senior, of Kilpatrick.

And this deed is also a re-construction of a deed, taken from "Appendix A" of Adrian Cardell document:

- (a) This dealing was <u>before</u> the establishment of the Register of Deeds in 1708. It has been possible to reconstruct it from the recitals to the dealing in Volume 68 Page 48 Number 46942.
- (b) The grant was a lease and release, "in fee farm forever" a conveyance of the freehold.
- (c) The area of land is measured, it would seem, in Irish Plantation Acres. 196 Statute (English) acres equal 121 Irish Plantation Acres. Much confusion arises therefore, in the 19th Century when one attempts to line up the areas held at, say Griffith's Valuation of Ireland in 1852, (measured in Statute acres), with areas stated in the Irish Deeds Register. Once it is understood that a "conversion" is required from Irish Plantation acres, the areas held in 1852, make sense.
- (d) In the succeeding Notes I have provided a "translation" of Irish Plantation acres into Statute (English) acres wherever appropriate.

## More details on this generation:

The Richard Bolton who purchased Ballyduff in 1705 is proven by land records to be the same as Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick; and he had four sons who grew to manhood and who inherited property from him. There is also strong evidence that he had at least one daughter—who married George Annseley.

# These sons were:

# 1] Edward Bolton, born abt 1696

Edward Bolton is identified as his eldest son and "heir apparent" in the earlier deeds; and Edward's college admission papers state that he was age 19 in 1714/15, making his birth year as an estimated 1696. The ages of the younger children are estimated from that birth year. Littlemore is known of him.

- 2] Richard Bolton Jr, born abt 1698. See above for limited information on him; and see below for deeds that identify him and his brothers.
- 3] William Bolton, born "abt 1700" little is known of him.
- 4] Henry Bolton, born "abt 1702" little is known of him. Per a deed, his wife's name was Elizabeth. See below.
- 5] there appears to be a daughter: Anne Bolton, who married in 1731 to George Annsley per

some secondary sources; he appears as witness in many of the deeds of this Richard Bolton family, beginning much earlier than 1731.

Dated 13 October 1730 between Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and William Bolton of Kilpatrick, son of Richard Bolton reciting that Robert Doyne did on 11 August 1702 demise to Richard Bolton the town and land of Kilpatrick, Crane and Ballinvalley during the life of said Richard Bolton, GRACE his wife and Edward Bolton his eldest son for a yearly rent to £71... Richard Bolton did make over to William Bolton his lease ...said William paying to Grace, wife of Richard Bolton £10 out of the profits. Signed by William Bolton, Witnesses by George Annesley and Henry Bolton

Again this deed is not signed by Richard Bolton Snr. It is what is called a Deed Memorial -- one of the witnesses has to be the same as one of the original witnesses to the land transfer recorded earlier. That witness is George Annsley. Anne Bolton and George Annesley were married in 1731.

It would appear that George Annsley is probably a son-in-law to this generation.



(Comment by Claire Sullivan): As you can see this memorial was not signed by Richard Bolton Snr. It refers to an original 'instrument' in writing dated 1727 when the land was assigned to Richard Bolton Jnr. One of the witnesses would have had to be a witness to this original 'instrument' in order for this memorial to be legal. Richard Bolton Snr. may therefore have been deceased by 1731. (For the entire deed, see Appendix A by Adrian Cardell.) 'Dated 13 October 1730 between Richard Bolton of Kilpatrick and William Bolton of Kilpatrick, son of Richard Bolton reciting that Robert Doyne did on 11 August 1702 demise to Richard Bolton the town and land of Kilpatrick, Crane and Ballinvalley during the life of said Richard Bolton, GRACE his wife and Edward Bolton his eldest son for a yearly rent to £71... Again this deed is not signed by Richard Bolton Snr. [It is citing an earlier deed that WAS signed by Richard Bolton Sr.]

(Note: This comment on recording error was made by Adrian Cardell. His comments are found in Appendix A of his document.)

Henry, son of Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick inherited an interest in Upper and Lower Kimihill

It also identified Henry's wife as Elizabeth

--Deed of Aug 25/26 1732 from Richard Bolton [Sr] of Kilpatrick, Gent to his son Henry Bolton of Carring in said county [Wexford].... for the lives of said Henry Bolton, Elizabeth his wife, and Rich'd Nixon, son of George Nixon of Newtown in the said county of Wexford, Gent...

See also Appendix A, of Adrian Cardell document, which later came to the attention of Elizabeth Nichols, for the complete deed.

These BOLTON deed abstracts were first sent to Elizabeth L Nichols via e-mail in 2013 and early 2014—from Claire Sullivan in Ireland; and later the document by Adrian Cardell was located and used. Still later, Elizabeth obtained photocopies of these four actual deeds pertaining to her ancestor, Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick and his four sons.

### Now.

And yet another deed from Claire Sullivan, telling us what happened to some of the land owned by Richard Bolton Sr of Kilpatrick and Ballyduff: Cardell doesn't seem to have this one.

deed of lease and release dated 7 March 1737 between Grace Bolton widow of Richard Bolton Snr of late of Kilpatrick gent Edward Bolton eldest son and heir of Richard Bolton snr decd Richard Bolton Jnr another son of Richard Bolton sen decd and John Davis of Enniscorthy Wexford of the first part. William Hore of City of Dublin Esq Court of Chancery of Ireland of the second part and Joseph West City of Dublin, Cooper of the third part whereby Grace Edward and Richard Jnr & John Davis William Hore in consideration of the sum of £750 etc. (think it goes on to describe the sale of Kilmihill). Witness Thomas Green and Richard Baxter Dublin Gent. Registered on 2 March 1741.

Richard Snr died between 1730 and 1737; he refers to some of his sons –his eldest two sons-apparently those involved in the deed of Kilmihill. John Davis of Enniscorthy is a party of the deed because he had a mortgage on the property and needed to be paid back."

NOTE: I have given this "original" Richard Bolton an estimated birth year of "about 1660" – which may be a bit early, but men often married a little later if they were involved in military or other activities that may have detained them from marriage. And that estimated date was given to him before I found the age of his eldest son Edward in the records. It is certainly a "guesstimated" date.

### IMPORTANT NOTE:

It is found that some segments of the Bolton family of County Wexford are sometimes attached to the wrong "original" ancestor –William or Richard. (Little is known about the "original" Henry Bolton.)

For example, William Bolton "of the Island" is listed in Burke's *Landed Gentry of Ireland* as belonging to the "original" Richard Bolton of Ballyduff family. Charles Knowles Bolton, in his book *Bolton Families in Ireland* – County Wexford section- places them there also, and some other writers having no better sources at the time of their writing have taken their data from these two sources.

But the deeds as presented in "Appendix A" by Adrian Cardell clearly show that William Bolton of the Island belong to the "original" William Bolton, through his son Henry Bolton who married Mary Hatton. Three of the children with their marriages and documentation that are given to Richard Bolton and Anne (Roberts) Bolton, prove to belong to the "original" William Bolton, and not to the "original" Richard Bolton of Ballyduff.

Source detail on "The Bolton Family of Island House, County Wexford" [Ireland] is found in a paper compiled by Claire Sullivan of Dublin, Ireland, for credit, at the University of Dublin, in 2015 (13 pages).

Therefore, research into these Bolton families of County Wexford, Ireland continues.
